As I searched for a way to introduce St. Laura of St. Catherine of Siena in a way that would quickly and clearly define her life, the one thought that kept coming to mind was the motto for the Extraordinary Jubilee of Mercy... "Merciful like the Father".

Laura Montoya Upegui was born on May 26, 1874, in Antioquia, Colombia.

In order to help her family financially, she trained as a teacher and began teaching in different parts of Antioquia, educating the students in academic knowledge, but also bringing them Gospel teachings and values.

She felt a growing desire to spread the Gospel and opened her heart to follow God's will. This drew her to helping the marginalized Indian population in South America. In 1914 she founded the "Missionaries of Mary Immaculate and St. Catherine of Siena" and set out with four other young women to live and work with the native Indians, where she spent the rest of her life. Today her Missionary Sisters work in 19 countries throughout America, Africa and Europe.

Mother Laura died on October 21, 1949, after a long and painful illness, and was canonized by Pope Francis on May 12, 2013. She truly embodied the Beatitude -- Blessed are they who hunger and thirst after justice; for they shall have their fill.

As Legislation Standing Committee Chairpersons, we too are filled with a yearning to change those things in society that we see as unjust, unfair and unchristian. God plants these yearnings in our hearts, nudging us to at least try to change the course of things.

Over the past year, we have been nudged by God in many ways ... maybe even at times strongly elbowed... as He has urged us to follow St. Laura's example.
