At each meeting the box is out on the table and members can drop in their stamps. These projects are ongoing all year round and the members are very generous with both of these initiatives.



#### **Little Angels**

In the Spring of 2013, the ladies of St. Francis Xavier Council in Mississauga decided to help fill a very special need. Infant death is one of the most devastating experiences any parent could face. Parents may experience anger and hopelessness, and many families grieve in silence. Parents who lose their babies often asked to see them. The babies are cleaned, dressed and given to the parents to hold for the last time... The clothes are used for the babies' funeral and the blankets are kept by the parents as mementos. Most of the babies are so tiny and clothes

are not easily available. The ladies offered to sew, knit, or crochet to dress these Little Angels.





**Helping the Youth Shelters** 

For the past several years the CWL members of Nativity of Our Lord Council in Etobicoke have also collected small winter items and toiletries for a youth shelter in their neighbourhood. The collection is kicked off at the October general meeting where larger toiletry bags are brought in and distributed. These are filled with many small items that the youth might need. The final collection is done on the day of their Christmas Brunch in December where all items are collected. The collection of soaps, shampoos, lotions and other personal grooming items along with mittens and socks all fill the many boxes of goodies that get delivered to the shelter in time for Christmas.



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#### **FogQuest**

In April of 2013, Melissa Rosato from an organization called FogQuest was a guest speaker at the St. John Chrysostom C.W.L. in Newmarket's general meeting. The invitation was extended to everyone in the parish. FogQuest is an international non-profit organization that sends volunteers to rural regions of developing countries to set up fog nets to catch fog, rain and dew

to provide sustainable water for the people, both for drinking and irrigation.



The technology is inexpensive and does not require electricity or generators. When the water is caught in the nets, it is delivered by gravity flow. The people benefitting are taught how to work with these nets. One of the very successful projects is located in Tojquia, Guatemala. Melissa had a wonderful presentation, including a mini fog net which she demonstrated. The work that the volunteers do is great and they continue to look for areas that can benefit from this most

"Pope Francis has directed that the problem of human trafficking be studied. This prompted a group of women religious to ask the pope to raise greater awareness in the church about the issue and a worldwide day of prayer and fasting has been established, February 8th, the Feast Day of St. Josephine Bakhita who was a Sudanese slave, found freedom in Italy and became a nun in the late 19th century. Some types of trafficking include forced labour, sexual exploitation and human organ harvesting all of which are profitable criminal activities. (Source: V.I.S. #### **Hunger Count 2013**

In March 2013, 833,098 people turned to a food bank in Canada, down from 872,379 the previous March. Underlying this small drop is a concern of enormous proportions: food bank use remains higher than it was before the recession began five years ago. During a time of apparent economic recovery, far too many Canadians still struggle to put food on the table. *HungerCount 2013* bears witness to the need for food banks across Canada and moves beyond this, to seek solutions that address the root causes. Our five recommendations are simple but significant action items that would move our country towards real progress. #### Ten Most needed food and household items

Pasta (canned or dry) & pasta sauces Canned goods (beans, soups, & stews) Canned and frozen meats and fish Whole grain cereals Bathroom tissue and diapers Meat alternatives (peanut butter, soy)
Dairy (fresh, canned, & powdered milk)
Canned vegetables and fruit
Infant foods and baby formula
Personal hygiene products

#### Consider these figures from <u>HungerCount 2013</u>:

- 9.4% (78,311,212) people each month access a food bank for the first time
- 36.4% of those turning to food banks are children and youth
- 4.3% of adults helped are over age 65
- 11.3% of people assisted are Aboriginal
- 50% of households helped receive social assistance
- 11.5% have income from current or recent employment
- 16.4% receive disability-related income supports
- 8% of food banks ran out of food during the survey period
- 50% of food banks needed to cut back on the amount of food provided to each household

- Events in our own communities (fires, floods, accidents, etc.)

We must remember that we are members of the Catholic Women's League, a national organization, rooted in gospel values, calling its members to holiness through service to the people of God.
