I write this to you on International Women's Day. A day that I hope you took the time to celebrate all the wonderful women who have gone before us to lay down the path for us to follow. The women who are with us now that mentor and care for us. The young women who we look to with hope for the future. "Make it happen".

The theme is "Empowering Women, Empowering Humanity: Picture it!"

As women of faith we need not look far for those that have inspired us and continue to guide us. Throughout all of history there have been women that at first glance would be the ones you would least expect to make a difference. With their true faith in God and love of His people they moved mountains. "God does not call the qualified, He qualifies the called."

The most incredible woman of all is Mother Mary with her selfless "Yes" that formed our history. The beautiful story of Mary's encounter with Elizabeth. It is that simple yet symbolic and profound gesture of compassion where our new national theme was derived from and what we as members are all about. Reaching out to others. In her wisdom she told them "Do whatever He tells you" and it still speaks to us thousands of years later. The amazing strength to endure the sword that pierced her heart to see her only son, crucified and put to death knowing it was meant to be. The devoted mother who stayed at the foot of the cross when others fled. Then how she held her son, Our Lord's, lifeless body wrapped in the agony of her own.

At a time when woman were excluded, Mary Magdalene had the courage to follow Jesus, learn his teachings and be the first to proclaim "I have seen the Lord!" Veronica's compassion gave her the courage to break through the crowds and past the soldiers to wipe the face of Jesus. These are the women, and many female saints, have that led the way on the journey of faith that we look to as role models for guidance.

I have always agreed with the phrase, "It is important to know where you are from to know where you are going." Knowing our history is how we can tell our story. Our faith, our families, the League. We are quickly approaching our 100^{th} anniversary and look with gratitude to pioneers Katherine Hughes and Bellelle Guerin, who our award is named after. It was Bellelle Guerin, author and social activist that was the president of the Catholic Women's Club in 1917. In June 1920, she called a meeting in Montreal to consider the unification of the branches of the CWL that existed in major cities across Canada. She was elected first dominion president of the national federation, the Catholic Women's League of Canada. The following year at the first national convention, held in Toronto, she expressed her belief in the future of the organization. "We may be said to be laying the cornerstone of an edifice that will arise fair and beautiful, strong and proud before the eyes of the



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world."

During her tenure as national president Bellelle saw the CWL become an important force for the integration of Catholic immigrants into the community, as well as an advocate for legislation affecting women, such as minimum wage acts and the Mothers' Allowance Act of Ontario. She promoted what she termed "Catholic feminism," which, according to her, called for a woman "to direct thought, to guard morals, and to carry her influence into the scale of justice whenever righteousness demands." Sometime after 1921 she changed the League's motto from *Laborare est orare* ("To labour is to pray") to the more inclusive and patriotic "For God and Canada."

Bellelle's role in the CWL was recognized in 1922 at a meeting of the International Union of Catholic Women's Leagues in Rome, when she became the first woman in Canada to receive *La Croce Pro Ecclesia et Pontifice* from the papacy. She was also favoured with a letter praising her good works and with an apostolic benediction from the Vatican. By 1923 the national membership of the CWL had grown to 50,000. At the annual convention held in Halifax, Bellelle was made honorary president for life. Bellelle Guerin died in 1929 at age 79. That same year the Montreal branch of the CWL established an annual scholarship in her memory at Marianopolis College, a private college for women

In 1906 Katherine Hughes moved to Edmonton as a journalist on the Edmonton Bulletin, where her duties included reporting on sessions of the Alberta legislature. Hughes remained active in the Canadian Women's Press Club and participated in the work of the Women's Canadian Club of Edmonton. In order to assist newly arrived Catholic immigrants, especially those from Eastern Europe, she established the Catholic Women's League of Edmonton in November 1912, the first branch of an organization that was not launched nationally until 1920. A dynamic, highly talented, and intelligent person who showed an amazing ability to transcend social, political, and cultural barriers, to accommodate herself to her new surroundings – whether on an Indian reserve, in the west, or amongst Irish activists – and to thrive. Her strong Catholic faith and belief in causes remained the cornerstones in her life.

All our past presidents, provincially and nationally have continued that esteemed tradition.

I recently attended my last national meeting as your president. There I sat in awe of the amazing women who sat around the table representing Canada. Each with different talents and gifts yet with the same faith and passion for the League and all it represents. Their incredible sense of spirituality radiates in all that they do.

This Lenten season, think of all those that have given of themselves to those in need. Those who have and continue to reached out with compassion to the broken hearted, poor and marginalized. Give thanks to God for them and for you because you are one of them.

Wishing you and your families the "Joy" of Easter.

This is the year Pope Francis will be welcoming the bishops, clergy and lay experts from around the world to discuss and focus on the global family of faith.

Focus on the Family Canada newsletter gives some eye opening information on Family of origin.

What is a family of Origin?

Our family of origin is the family we were born or adopted into. It's the people who raise us and who we spend most of our childhood with. The importance of an individual's family of origin is enormous. Since parenting shapes a child's core beliefs about himself or herself, our family's beliefs about what it means to be human and the purpose of life will have a tremendous influence on what we learn and how we develop. These beliefs will, in turn, inform every decision and choice you make and every relationship you have.

The beliefs, values and rules of a family are passed down from one generation to the next through living life together daily, and this is how an unhealthy or healthy family of origin is perpetuated. It also points out "In marriage all too often man and women look to their spouse for what they didn't get in childhood from their parents.

I will quote two statements that they emphasized on.

The Father wound:

We all come into the world helpless, dependent and needing acceptance, to be treated as worthy, and to be blessed. The *father wound* is the absence of this love from your birth father. The wound can be caused by:

Neglect - I am unimportant

Absence – Divorce, separation, death

Abuse – Mental, physical, sexual, spiritual

Control – Oppressive domination

Withholding – *Love, blessings and/or affirmation*, deficiencies that lead to a profound lack of self-acceptance.

It states "often a person's image of God the father is contaminated by the personal The Mother wound:

We all come into the world needing the tender presence of a mother's touch, nurture, care and love. In fact the mother's influence begins when we are in the womb. The absence of this mother love is a wound that is created in three ways:

Mother is separated from the child through:

illness of the mother

mother's death

divorce

The experience he or she has with the birth father."

Again it states: "Jesus...provides an assurance of worth and helps you know the True Self that He created."
