
Pauline's Ponderings...

Diocese of Hamilton

On February 29, 2016, the Diocese of Hamilton celebrated its 160th Anniversary. The diocese was established in 1856 and at that time it was made up of 28,000 Catholics, nine parishes, sixteen missions, four priests and three sisters of St. Joseph.

Today, it is the second largest English speaking Roman Catholic Diocese in Canada encompassing the counties of Brant, Bruce, Grey, Halton, Waterloo, Wellington and four townships in the county of Dufferin and includes 123 parishes.

May 13, 2016 to May 15, 2016, The Catholic Women's League of Canada, in the Diocese of Hamilton, will celebrate its 96th Convention at the Crowne Plaza in Kitchener, Ontario.

Currently there are 99 Catholic Women's League parish councils comprised of approximately 10,000 members within the Hamilton Diocese.

Since 2014, **St. Michael's CWL parish council, Waterloo**, have applied Resolution 2013.01 Building Relationships and Partnerships with Canada's Indigenous Peoples and it was taken to heart within their council. Fellow member Marie Lehmann introduced the Immaculate Conception Parish in M'Chigeeng First Nation Ontario at a general meeting through pictures of their unique teepee-shaped circular church and their special furnishings. During the Christmas season, the Good Hearted Women Singers joined with the choirs of St. Michael's and Our Lady of Lourdes in song for our parishioners including showing how they praise the Creator with their drum circle.

In May 2015, St Michael's Resolution Chairperson Shani Pregelj informed members of the plight facing Aboriginal youth. Members signed and sent letters to MPs to ask our government to act on the items in the document Feathers of Hope, a First Nation Youth action plan. This was our response to **Resolution ON.14.02** Feathers of Hope – Empowering First Nations Youth.

Through the above events, many new friendships were formed. Members and parishioners got to know our Aboriginal neighbours better.

7. Ask these questions often: What do you need to put down to follow Jesus? What are you doing to learn about Jesus? Where is God talking to you in your life?





LENT – excerpt from Pope Francis' message

"For all of us, then, the season of Lent in this Jubilee Year is a favourable time to overcome our existential alienation by listening to God's word and by practising the works of mercy. In the corporal works of mercy we touch the flesh of Christ in our brothers and sisters who need to be fed, clothed, sheltered, visited; in the spiritual works of mercy — counsel, instruction, forgiveness, admonishment and prayer — we touch more directly our own sinfulness. The corporal and spiritual works of mercy must never be separated. By touching the flesh of the crucified Jesus in the suffering, sinners can receive the gift of realizing that they too are poor and in need. By taking this path, the "proud", the "powerful" and the "wealthy" spoken of in the *Magnificat* can also be embraced and undeservedly loved by the crucified Lord who died and rose for them. This love alone is the answer to that yearning for infinite happiness and love that we think we can satisfy with the idols of knowledge, power and riches."

The Easter story is rich in powerful contrasts. The birth of Jesus, a seemingly illegitimate child, born in squalor, lived a life under threat from the very beginning.
