Fr. Donald Lizzotti, Rector of the cathedral and spiritual advisor of the parish council, was the celebrant of the mass. He also gave a virtual tour of the Cathedral enlightening us with tidbits of Cathedral and diocesan history. The Cathedral parish council prepared a lovely reception, evident of tender loving care, for those attending to enjoy. The evening was yet another opportunity to

experience faith, fun, and fulfillment.

Man of the Shroud Exhibit – St. Alfred Parish Council, St Catharines

Many CWL members volunteered and assisted with the organization of the **Man of the Shroud** exhibit, an extensive exhibition on the history, science and significance of the Shroud of Turin, that was hosted at St. Alfred Church from March 2 to 8, 2016. The exhibit included museum boards and replica artifacts related to the Crucifixion of Christ. Shroud scholar Barrie Schwortz presented information that science and forensics confirm the authenticity of the Shroud. Barrie left audiences with these undeniable facts: there are no pigments, paints, inks, caulk or dyes which in any way contributed to the



formation of the image. Shroud scholar, John Iannone related the Shroud image to the phenomenon of the resurrection. Many scientists agree the image was formed by an extremely high density, short duration burst (milliseconds) of radiant energy.

The community life standing committee is a committee of action. How do we respond to our Christian calling? Are our arms outstretched to give of ourselves and live our League prayer to- "share with others at home and abroad the good things You have given us".

Our aboriginal sisters and their families need our help. We need to stay vigilant with the federal government to ensure they keep their campaign promises with regard to aboriginal issues. In the recent federal budget, funds have been allocated to assist First Nation people with key issues: access to water, quality education, health and social services especially for youth, year round access and employment. Many reserves are experiencing conditions that are the same or worse than in developing countries. The youth have lost hope based on the suicide rates that are at a crisis stage on some reserves. There is media attention to the plights/causes of the First Nations people so stay current and ask your federal representative to be sure that the government honours their commitment to our native peoples. There are two resolutions that can help; ON 14.02 Feathers of Hope-Empowering First Nations Youth and ON11.01 Safe Potable Water

Did you know?

There is a new brochure about the 1% program for Development and Peace and an updated PowerPoint on the National Website for First Nation Communities.

At the Winter Provincial Meeting all diocesan council presidents were give a list of parish councils that have fewer than 15 members. Let us all help build up our "community" of sisters by sending them cards of encouragement and staying in touch. One council only has two members. We can let them know that we are united with them and praying for them.

Almost every diocese in the province is assisting Syrian refugees, either through sponsorship or sending funds to help the refugee camps in Turkey and Jordan. History is repeating itself, as The Catholic Women's League of Canada began by helping immigrant who came to Canada, many years ago. Today parish councils can welcome the "New Canadians" into their communities by hosting a welcome shower or tea. Councils can shower them with cooking recipes, small items for the kitchen or children's toys/clothing/school supplies. All such items will be a big help the families. Volunteer to take them grocery shopping using a list that is in Arabic and English so that you can communicate easily with the family member. Go on the website www.syriancooking.com to get the grocery list and a list of items that are usually found in a Syrian kitchen. Mothers are the "glue" in most families, so let's help them feel at home so they can help the other members of their families adjust to our country.



Provincial Government Visits By Linda Squarzolo

On Wednesday, May 4, 2016 a group representing the Ontario Provincial Council of The Catholic Women's League of Canada visited the Ontario Legislature. The meetings were organized by Linda Squarzolo, 2nd Vice President/ Resolutions Chair. Also in attendance were President Pauline Krupa, President-elect Anne Madden, Past President Betty Colaneri and Legislation Chair Carol Richer.

At each meeting Pauline gave an overview of the League and its work. The government was informed about our views on doctor-assisted

suicide and our belief that life begins with conception and ends with natural death. They were also told that May 4th had been designated a day of prayer for hospice and palliative care.

Meetings were held with Hon. Bill Mauro, Minister of Natural Resources and Forestry; Ms. France Gelinas, NDP Critic for Health and Long-term Care as well as Aboriginal Affairs; Mr. Glenn Thibeault, Parliamentary Assistant to the Minister of Environment and Climate Change; Scott Kirkham, Senior Policy Advisor to the Minister of Municipal Affairs and

Housing and Hon. Tracy MacCharles, Minister of Children and Youth Services.

Ministers and MPPs were commended for their initiatives such as Bill – 132, the use of tanning beds, banning microbeads in personal care products and neonicotinoid pesticides. Discussions were held relating to League resolutions mental health services for children and youth, regulated housing for the chronically mentally ill, awareness of colorectal cancer, infrared breast screening thermography, safe water for First Nations communities, funding for diabetes supplies, "Feathers

of Hope", mandatory police checks and funding for hospice and palliative care. Other topics were also introduced, such as the Ring of Fire, land claims and health care in remote communities. The committee was also given information regarding new programs that will be introduced by the government in the near future, including funding to eliminate homelessness, telehealth psychiatric services, coordination of mental health services and support for the well-being of families.

During Question Period the CWL members were invited to the visitors' gallery and Hon. Bill Mauro introduced them to the legislature by

name. The committee was impressed with the welcome received at Queen's Park and the wonderful conversation that was generated at each of the meetings.
