PETERBOROUGH DIOCESE HOSTS SISTERS IN CHRIST RETREATS!




The Vocations Office of the Peterborough, Diocese of encouraged by the Christian Family Life Chair, has begun a series of retreats for high school-aged young women called the 'Sisters in Christ' (SIC) retreats. Seventeen attended the girls retreat, titled *The Adventure* Begins, held Oct. 21-23 at the Sisters of St. Joseph Retreat Centre in Cobourg. The focus of the retreat was vocational discernment - how do the young women find the

purpose God created them for, in order that they can be deeply satisfied? The girls were introduced to the idea that there are three vocations they may be called to - the committed single life, marriage or consecrated religious life. Three religious orders were present to guide the young women and to have fun with them.

Lest We Forget!

In over two hundred years, there has not been one day without some kind of war on earth...political, tribal, religious, territorial, civil, regional or global.

Few of us have any real experience of war, even though there are horrific atrocities taking place all around the world. Canada has been at the forefront in providing safe shelter for many who have lived with the atrocities of war, and who have come as refugees to our great country

The closest most of us have come to war in this nation may be that some of us, or our loved ones, have served in the military and have actually seen firsthand the devastation of such evils. The valiant men and women who have volunteered to play a selfless role in protecting our freedoms, and in fighting for the freedom of the oppressed in war torn countries, deserve our reverence and gratitude.

Days like Remembrance Day are vital. We need moments like this to reflect on what it means to be free, what it means to have had someone else pay the price of freedom. What a thankless and undeserving nation we would be, if we didn't take moments like Remembrance Day to honour the sacrifices others have made, both those who have survived and those who have died. We need to reflect on these things again and again. It is why we need Remembrance Day every year, to set aside our daily routines and focus on those who have fought and continue to defend human rights and democracy.

For Christians, Remembrance Day presents a unique opportunity for us to reflect on the way of peace. The words of Jesus as recorded in *John 20.21* tell us how we are called by the Holy Spirit to announce the good news of God's peaceable kingdom... "Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, even so I am sending you". We are called to embody God's peace in the world. God is calling <u>us</u> to be peacemakers.

As we 'remember' this year, let us seize the opportunity to prayerfully take to heart the message of the Prince of Peace, and discern together the ways in which God is calling us to be peacemakers in His world.

It is critical that we make a concerted effort to turn our hearts and minds towards a state of remembrance, doing as Paul admonished: "The peace that Christ gives is to guide you in the

decisions you make; for it is to this peace that God has called you together in the one body" (Colossians 3.15)

"Blessed are the peacemakers, for they will be called children of God" (Matthew 5.9)
