

My family moved to Ottawa when I was ten. My mother and grandmother were involved in the CWL. In only a short time, Mom was CWL convenor of the hospitality committee, which organized funeral lunches and catering for various banquets in the area. I participated by peeling potatoes or washing dishes for the many events. The sink used to be the right height, but as I grew taller it was too low for me. That is my story and I am sticking to it. When the time came and I was old enough, I became a member of the CWL at St. Ignatius the Martyr council in 1974; it was just the natural thing for me to do. Over the years and even when I lived in different places, I kept up my membership, but was not really involved in the leadership of the League. Then it was time; I was back in Ottawa and on the parish CWL executive. Our president became ill and I was elected president. At the time, I felt that, even though I had been in the League for years, I did not really understand it.

I attended my first CWL provincial convention in Arnprior and my first national convention, held here in Ottawa. I was hooked. My life has been enriched. The knowledge, friends, faith and confidence have all been a gift. Today I smile when I pass the church hall kitchen sink and give thanks for the women who have journeyed with me, all these years. The CWL has been an important part of the lives of the women in my family; my grandma, aunts, mom (diocesan treasure), my sister (diocesan community life), my sister-in-law as diocesan president and my niece all are/were proud CWL members.

Fifteen years ago, I was in end stages of renal failure and was a candidate for kidney transplant. Some were concerned that I might not make it, but I believed and knew that it was not time for me to die. God had something in store for me. I had a live kidney transplant and am here today in awe. Little did I know how the CWL would be such a big part of my life. Through situations/events, I knew it was time for me to be more active in the League.

I have served on diocesan council as spiritual development chair, education and health chair, organization chair and president and now past president. At provincial level, I am community life chair. I am learning so much and enjoy the wisdom shared, at this level.

One never knows what is next, but be open, have faith and trust and God will lead you. Take a chance; it is time!

MY MOTHER

Catherine McAlear (Wood)

My Mom was born in 1903 the fourth in the line of ten children to Mary Ellen & Clarence Wood (it was a mixed marriage)

She was raised in the village of Lunenburg ON. where her father was the Blacksmith and traded his work for food to feed the family as money was very scarce. It was while she was a little girl playing in the shop that she remembers the Priest coming to the shop to give her father catechism lessons to become a Catholic.

She received her education in a little one room school grades 1-8 and never

went to high school. She had two sisters (the oldest & youngest which were twenty years apart) who entered the order of "The Religious Hospitallers of St. Joseph". Upon taking their final vows they both choose the name "Sr. Wood" out of respect of their father having turned Catholic.

My grandparents and family moved to their new home in Cornwall when my Mom was 20 years old. At which time she went to work as a seamstress at the local Pants Factory (which made men's suits) where she worked until she married my Dad in 1940.

My parents had two children, my brother and I. My Mom was a stay at home housewife raising her two children. When I was four our little family moved in with her Mother so that my Mom could look after her mother who had congestive heart failure and was getting weaker.

Mom was very dedicated to her family, friends and her religion. She attended Mass daily and visited the sick and shut-in as well. She belonged to the Sacred Heart Program and was a promoter. Every month she would pick up the magazines for her members at St. Columban's church and take us with her to deliver them.

Times were hard as Dad worked in a factory and his salary was small, but Mom was very thrifty with the money. She made all our clothes even our coats and leggings. She also did some sewing for the neighbors. She was a wonderful seamstress but a perfectionist.

She taught me to knit at a very young age and when she was satisfied with my knitting she taught me to sew. When I would get discouraged and want to give up because the piece I was making wasn't working out right after ripping out the stitches for the umpteenth time she would just say: "Put it away and take it out later and finish it". I always had to finish the piece before she would let me start a new one no matter how long I left it. I must admit they were two of the many wonderful gifts that she passed on to me.

I have so many wonderful memories of my Mother but the one I remember the most was her helping me to make my wedding dress, veil and cape. We had a great time picking out the materials and piecing two or three patterns together to have it just the way I wanted it to be.

After my Dad died Mom came to live with us our family of eight, (she had very crippling arthritis) so I had the honor to help her in her trying time of loss both physically and mentally for five years. She died at the age of 82, in 1985.

Thanks Mom, my best friend. Rest in peace.

The election campaign has officially begun ... in one month, we will exercise our democratic right (and duty) to vote in the 42nd Ontario general election to elect the members of the 42nd Parliament of Ontario (Legislative Assembly of Ontario).
