2018 RESOLUTIONS UPDATE

The resolutions passed at the 2018 Ontario provincial convention were:

ON.18.01 Develop national standards for levels of pharmaceuticals in Canada's drinking water

ON.18.02 Full implementation of *Income Security: A Roadmap for Change* for disabled adult Ontarians

ON.18.03 To fully implement alternative sentencing to incarceration of Indigenous offenders

ON.18.02 was forwarded to other provinces to make them aware of this issue and requesting each to review the situation in their own province.

ON.18.01 and ON.18.02 were not accepted for presentation at the National convention. The reasons paraphrased from the letters received from national office were:

- ON.18.01 The national resolutions committee noted the World Health Organization's ("WHO") recommendations state (page 28) " ... development of formal guideline values for pharmaceuticals in <u>WHO</u> <u>Guidelines for Drinking-water Quality</u> and the installations of specialized treatment processes to reduce trace concentrations of pharmaceuticals are not warranted."
- ON.18.03 The national resolutions committee noted there was "lack of proof that Section 81 and 84 ... are not being implemented. In addition, the committee noted "Correctional Service Canada has agreed with the recommendations of the Office of Auditor General of Canada Report" and "committed to take corrective action to improve results for Indigenous offenders."

Despite these resolutions not being presented at the national convention, councils are encouraged to take action.

The provincial legislation committee is encouraged by the positive feedback from those who have participated ... they discovered programs in their own communities ... recognized the challenges faced by those without a home ... are planning meetings with their MP/MPP ... and are reviewing the legislation in place and resolutions passed.

We are compiling the information gathered from all of the surveys into one report ... stay tuned!

A Pilgrimage to the Holy Land By Linda Squarzolo

At the end of June the Catholic Near East Welfare Association (CNEWA) organized a trip for CWL members to visit the Holy Land on a ten-day pilgrimage. What an unforgettable trip it was! The tour took us to many of the holy sites in Israel and Palestine. I was deeply moved to visit the actual site of the birth of Jesus in Bethlehem, to pray in the Garden of Gethsemane, to be at the foot of the cross on Calvary and to touch the stone on which Jesus was placed after being taken down from the cross. This experience was memorable!

Although visiting the holy places was wonderful, another aspect of this trip was to meet with Christians who are living and working in the Holy Land. CNEWA is a papal agency, which supports many of their projects. Did you know that CNEWA is one of the national council's voluntary funds? The League supports two of their projects, Shepherd's Field Hospital and the Infant Welfare Centre. These projects are known as "**Velma's Dream**" in honour of a past national president, Velma Harasen.

Shepherd's Field Hospital is located near Bethlehem. Currently, a modern hospital is under construction to serve its clients. Social cases, 45 to 50 monthly, receive services free-of-charge. The hospital is able to do this because of the partnership with charities, like the CWL and CNEWA, who pay 50%, while the co-operative pays the difference. Women and children make up 67% of patients. We were given a tour of the new building, which will open in a few months.

We often see the results of our CWL donations in our own communities and country. How awesome it was to see the difference we are making for Christians in the Holy Land.



The Shepherd's Field Hospital Co-operative gave the pilgrimage group a tour of the new hospital, which will open in the near future. They also presented CWL National Secretary/Treasurer Janet McLean with a wooden carving of the Holy Family in recognition of the CWL's ongoing support. The carving will be displayed at National Office in Winnipeg.

Rosary Sunday 2018

Sunday, September 9th was another perfect day for Rosary Sunday at the Martyrs Shrine in Midland. The weather was sunny, yet slightly cool, making it very comfortable to be outdoors for the noon mass celebrated at the Polish Altar by Father Thomas Rosica of Salt + Light TV. Following the final blessing, those who wished were offered the opportunity to come forward to be blessed with a relic of one of the martyrs.

The procession of the Blessed Sacrament to the Papal Altar, at 2:30 p.m. included the Senior Marshall, District Deputies, VIP's (K of C and CWL), 4th Degree Knights, Living Cross, Acolytes, clergy, deacons, religious sisters, flower girls, statue of Our Lady, a cross bearer, Rosary participants, *Knights on Bikes* and parish groups carrying banners. Participants of the Living Rosary each wore a simple pale blue tunic and represented more ethnic groups than I could identify. Each participant prayed in his/her language. To have so many nationalities/cultures praying together symbolized perfectly the diversity of



today's Church.

The five CWL members privileged to participate by reciting a brief meditation before each of the Glorious Mysteries were: Margaret Jacobs, National Ann Past President, myself, Ann D'Souza, Toronto Diocesan President, Alice Warford, Toronto Spiritual Development Chairperson and Sue Gribbons-Shrubsole, Northern Regional Chairperson.

The day included Benediction and Liturgy of the Word. As he began his homily at the Papal Altar, Father Rosica invited all the young children and youth to come and sit with him, and many did. The gospel chosen was the Visitation and Father Rosica gave a very eloquent, yet explanation down-to-earth, of The Visitation and why it is so important. He also reminded us that we were on holy *ground*, as a saint had celebrated mass in this very spot some 34 years ago, referring to Pope John Paul II on his papal visit to Canada in 1984.

At **Our Lady of the Atonement Council's (Windsor, ON)** 25th Anniversary dinner, on June 2018, the Bellelle Guerin Award was presented to Angie Papineau.

When the family moved into Windsor she was disappointed that there was no CWL Council at the Parish of Atonement. Eventually she met up with Anna Koehl who also was very interested in forming a CWL here. In late 1992 they approached Fr. Damian MacPherson, pastor at the time, and sought permission to explore the possibility of a Council, which he



supported whole heartily. She arranged for an information meeting for interested women from the parish with members of the London Diocesan Council on January 25th 1993.

Thirty-nine (39) women attended that meeting, they heard the information, liked what they heard, signed on the dotted line and became our Charter members of the brand new Council here. And so our Council was born.

Angie guided the CWL as the first president from 1993 –1995, then again from 1998-2001. She was the Spiritual Chairperson on our executive from 2004 – 2013. She also served on the London Diocesan Council for two years as the Windsor Regional representative.

The spirituality of the CWL attracted Angie to become a member years ago and that has always been her focus, - planning retreats, reflection

days, special ceremonies, and preparing prayers for our monthly meetings. She continues to this day to submit spiritual material to be included in the Fall and Spring Atonement CWL newsletters.

Angie has been a very active supporter of all our programs and activities over the years. She has maintained the Book of Life, (a record of our deceased members and Spiritual Advisers) our archives, photo books and scrapbooks for the last 25 years.

She proudly wears her CWL pin every day. She is a wonderful friend, mentor and faithful sister to all our members and very worthy of this Award.
