KINGSTON: Pilot Project for delivery-care system for Talk Therapy

Talk Therapy includes cognitive behavior therapy (CBT), a successful evidence-based therapy for many mental health diagnoses. CBT focuses on changing negative thoughts and behaviours and learning coping strategies and especially helps

individuals suffering from anxiety and depression. With successful implementation by other countries showing cost-effectiveness and efficiency, members are suggesting a similar regulatory framework in Ontario as the federal government through health accords with the provinces and territories, targets \$5 billion over 10 years for mental health and home care.

LONDON: Abortion and the Effects on Mental Health

It's been nearly five decades since abortion was legalized in Canada, ample time for statistics to be gathered from around the world that show the negative effects of abortion on the mental health of women, which include depression, suicide, and drug abuse. The numbers are in and it's time for Ontario Health to take note and warn women of these risks before they make such a life - changing decision. Without the facts, women are not able to make an informed choice. Women have a right to the information before an abortion is performed.

LONDON: Equal Access to Permanent Resident Status, an Amendment to the Express Entry System under the Immigration and Refugee Protection Act as it relates to Religious Workers



In order for Religious Workers to be able to receive permanent residency in Canada, they are seeking an exemption to the new Express Entry rules by the Canadian Government. With recent the changes to immigration regulations, specifically the Express Entry system, Religious Workers have had their applications for Permanent Residence rejected. The Comprehensive Ranking

System that Canada has adopted to rank candidates has become a barrier to immigration for these religious workers applying to minister in Canada. The objective of Express Entry is to create efficiencies by making the submission of electronic applications for permanent residence mandatory. The process requires applicants to create an online profile based on age, language ability, education and Canadian and foreign work experience. According to the new Express Entry regulations, the Religious Workers do not fit the present "profile" that is required before being invited by the Government to apply for Permanent Residence.

TIMMINS: Qualified Physical and Music Educators in Ontario Schools

Education in the arts is essential for students' intellectual, social, physical and emotional growth and wellbeing. Experiences in physical activity and music assist students to achieve their potential as learners and

to participate fully in their community and society as a whole. In 2018, 94% of elementary schools reported connecting or working with mental health care services. Although the Ontario Curriculum endorses health and physical activity as essential, only 40%



of Ontario's elementary schools have specialist teachers; most are part-time, and only half of them teach all students in the school. The 2018 People for Education Arts report found deficits and inequities in music education; 46% of schools indicated they have a qualified music teacher, more than 40% of schools reported having no music at their schools, qualified or unqualified.

TORONTO: Need for Canadian Research into short-and long-term side effects of the hormonal contraceptive pill

A large majority of young Canadian women are being prescribed the oral hormonal contraceptive pill despite the lack of adequate and up to date medical research into its side effects, some of them lethal. A framework should be established to track the prescribing of birth control and the health of recipients to establish on-going research and study of trends for health and public policy to protect all Canadians.
