Reports about the increase of physical violence, drug and alcohol abuse and senior abandonment are heart wrenching. Last but not least, are you aware how the lack of priests and other religious are overwhelming the few who must administer the many?

The London Diocese has texted and emailed, and many picked up the old-fashioned phone and even sent a card by snail mail. Many of our councils embraced the Virtual World. Many have learned to Zoom, Go to Meeting, or use Microsoft team. Due to Wi-Fi, many hours of hard work, the great collaboration between Christian Family Life and Community Life, our regional chairpersons and the knowledge and guidance of Alex and Genevieve Schadenberg we held a two-session workshop on Compassionate Community Care. In the sessions we learned how to interact with the most vulnerable and were introduced to writing "My Story". The Chatham-Kent Region councils have continued to participate and/or support their parish Christian Family Life programs in a modified safe fashion over this past Covid year.

Many councils continued to support their parish sacramental programs financially and prayerfully; sent spiritual bouquets to their lonely members and/or overwrought parish priests and one council initiated "Prayer Angel" lines to pray for a grieving member and their immediate family.

The Chatham-Kent council members who virtually participated in the "Community Compassionate Care" program earlier this year, have ensuing member interest in the creation of a post-Covid community visitor squad throughout neighbouring communities, LTC and senior support facilities. Some councils chose to share the "Year of St. Joseph" prayer with members who were then instructed to share this prayer with other family and community members to afford them "protection" with instruction to keep passing along this prayer and its associated explanation about St. Joseph "faithful protector".

With time at home, many members knit, sewed, constructed, or gathered baby blankets for Refuge, leprosy wraps and blankets for Canadian Food for Children.

All councils reported increase in personal communication among members with regular phone checks or porch visits, newsletters, and notes of encouragement, some attached to spring seed packets as "tokens of hope" and an early Easter Resurrection reminder that "all are loved".

St. John the Divine CWL Environment Committee following the national theme "Care for Our Common Home" raised awareness for electricity usage, water consumption, plastic impacts, food awareness, clothing impacts as well as 'Do Actions' using CWL created and professional videos. Prayers for Christmas and pandemic were issued to CWL members. The initiative of the Pen pal program focuses on matching CWL members to share in telling their story in making a new CWL friendship. A dozen virtual 'Thinking of You' cards were provided to members to share with anyone they wish.

Council has been very active in carrying out various acts of service/charitable donations in the Parish and Community. Council is very fortunate to have enough funds to support the various activities: Donated \$1000 to Learnington Community Outreach for the homeless just before COVID struck. The council also donated \$3000 to update Parish technology to support live-strearning Masses/Bible Studies and various other live-strearning activities which many of our members participate in.

Some members sent thinking of you/encouragement cards to pregnant girls at Our Lady of Guadalupe House in Windsor at Christmas.

> Now, with the current province wide lockdown, we are having virtual Prayers for Palliative care. Councils are providing prayers for members who are praying at home throughout the day on May 8th. Handwritten cards and virtual cards are being sent to seniors, the lonely and the homebound. The Healing Power of Touch

The relationship with my mother-in-law has changed over the years. Our roles have switched in some ways. No longer is she the care giver, chief cook, and bottle washer, tending to her own children and then her grandchildren. Her days are now lived out in a nursing home, in a wheelchair, limited in her ability to perform the daily tasks that came to her as easily as her breathing. She has dementia and is now the care receiver.

Dementia puts individuals into their own little bubbles that are sometimes difficult to break open. In a pre-Covid world, a light touch on her arm or a gentle rub on her hand would be enough to light a spark, make a connection with her. As so many family members have found with loved ones in care homes, the physical distancing and inability to touch a loved one with a caress, a kiss, or a hug has been a most difficult experience. We are unable to make that connection and the bubble encasing our loved one becomes more pronounced.

As I reflect on the current situation, I have begun to wonder whether the need for touch my need as my mother-in-law's is as much. The following verse connects water and touch as two life giving forces, both working to heal a wounded soul and a wounded world; touch connected to our provincial theme of *Loneliness* and water to National's year two focus under Care of Our Common Home.

Nourished, like the life-giving water on a parched earth deprived of rain.

Nourished, like the life-giving water on a dry throat thirsting for relief.

So, to a person nourished by the sound of the human voice, responding to the words of a son, a daughter, a friend, or a care giver.

Nourished by the touch of a human hand gently caressing a hand, arm, face.

Recognizing the dignity of being alive, the person we have always known but now hidden in this shroud they call dementia.

Acknowledging the loneliness, the aloneness

Offering a healing presence

Just as water gives to the earth, to the thirsty person,

The parched earth, the body, revives.

So, the person revives by a small act of presence, human touch.

A Tribute to a Friend Carol Richer February 19, 1940 - April 13, 2021

This was the beginning of their travels around North America; finally settling in Morrisburg Ontario where they lived for 44 years.



Carol had been a member of the Catholic Women's League for 57 years, during which time she has held all executive positions at the parish level and was presented with the Maple Leaf Service Pin by St. Mary's/St. Cecilia's Parish Council in 2006.

She has served on the Kingston Diocesan Council of the Catholic Women's League as Recording Secretary, First Vice President/ Organization Chairperson, President and Past President/Historian. She served three terms on the Ontario Provincial Council of the Catholic Women's League as Recording Secretary, as Chairperson of the Education and Health Standing Committee, and as Chairperson of the Legislation Standing Committee. Carol was honoured in 2013 by being awarded a Life Membership in the League. As provincial Education and Health Chairperson, Carol and her committee developed a new Education Pamphlet which was distributed throughout the province to reduce the stigma attached to Mental Illness. This led to her writing 'A Prayer for Those Living with Mental Illness'.

Carol will be missed by her family and friends and especially her many sisters in The Catholic Women's League of Canada across the entire country.

The Bummer Lamb



Every once in a while, an ewe will give birth to a lamb and reject it. There are many reasons she may do this. If the lamb is returned to the ewe, the mother may even kick the poor animal away. Once an ewe rejects one of her lambs, she will never change her mind.

These little lambs will hang their heads so low that it looks like something is wrong with its neck. Their spirit is broken.

These lambs are called "bummer lambs." Unless the shepherd intervenes, that lamb will die, rejected

and alone. So, do you know what the shepherd does?

He takes that rejected little one into his home, hand-feeds it and keep it warm by the fire. He will wrap it up with blankets and hold it to his chest so the bummer can hear his heartbeat. Once the lamb is strong enough, the shepherd will place it back in the field with the rest of the flock.

But that sheep never forgets how the shepherd cared for him when his mother rejected him. When the shepherd calls for the flock, guess who runs to him first?

That is right, the bummer sheep. He knows his voice intimately.

It is not that the bummer lamb is loved more, it just knows intimately the one who loves it. It's not that it is loved more, it just believes it because it has experienced that love one on one.

So many of us are bummer lambs, rejected and broken. But He is the Good Shepherd. He cares for our every need and holds us close to His heart so we can hear His heartbeat.

We may be broken but we are deeply loved by the Shepherd.
