
Toronto 2020 and 2021 Partial Virtual AGMs

The Toronto Diocesan Council held their 99th and 100th partial virtual annual general meetings on Saturday May 15th. The diocesan executive reported on the four AGM themes on *Loneliness, Care for Our Common Home, 100th Anniversaries for National and Toronto* and the *Year of St. Joseph*. The AGM started with live streamed Mass from St. Edward the Confessor Parish celebrated by Msgr. Patrick O'Dea, Spiritual Advisor. The 100th AGM included the Crowning of Mary, video recognition of events over the years from councils and diocesan conventions and pre-recorded greetings from His Eminence Thomas Cardinal Collins. There were 287 voting, accredited, members and spiritual advisors in attendance.

Msgr. Pat's 40th Ordination Anniversary

Msgr. Patrick O'Dea, Diocesan Spiritual Advisor celebrated his 40th ordination anniversary on September 19th. Members collected a spiritual bouquet with a total of 88,728 prayer offerings in (masses, communions, rosaries, devotions, etc.) and best wishes were provided on the online Kudoboard digital card.

In addition, this congratulatory ad was placed in the Catholic Register on behalf of members in the Diocese. Msgr. Pat, has been a gift to the diocesan council since his appointment as Diocesan Spiritual Advisor in May 2016. He is appreciated for his unwavering support to the members, spiritual advisors, and the League.

The workshop included a prayer service on diversity, review of Toronto 2020 Diversity Stats. Keynote speaker Dr. Angela Cooper Brathwaite spoke on the Spiritual Dimension of Cultural Competence which was followed by presentation of performances from members in cultural costumes.



Toronto Diocesan Council celebrating 100 Years in 2021



The Toronto Diocesan Council was formed during the first national convention, held in Toronto on June 3, 1921. Mary McMahon was elected the first president, and His Grace Archbishop Neil McNeil became the spiritual director. Hilarion Mitchell, President and Msgr. Patrick O'Dea, Spiritual Advisor ushered in the 100th anniversary year. Life Member Mary Hawkley was the Chair of the Anniversary Committee. A Madonna Pin was designed by member, Irene Debono to commemorate this occasion and the committee provided a 100th Anniversary Certificate to each council and spiritual advisor in the Diocese, following the celebrations.

One Hundred Years: Growing in Faith, Love and Service

As part of the celebration, Toronto Diocese held a virtual Anniversary Celebration on June 3rd with 370 members in attendance including current and past diocesan spiritual advisors and invited guest, Colleen Perry, and Anne Marie Gorman. The celebrations included an Anniversary prayer service, poetry, highlight of the council's accomplishments, video greetings and toasts for the past, present, and future.

The highlight of the yearlong celebrations was a Centennial Mass held on October 7th at St. Michael's Cathedral Basilica commencing with The Luminous Mysteries of the Rosary, led by the chairs. The principal regional celebrant was Bishop Robert Kasun, Auxiliary Bishop of the Central Region. There were close to 100 in-person including Margaret Ann Jacobs, Honorary Life Member, life members, three immediate past diocesan spiritual advisors and members from throughout the diocese.

Toronto Diocesan Council - CWL Wednesday

Truth and Reconciliation Commission's Calls to Action

The Toronto Diocesan Council hosted *The Truth and Reconciliation Commission's (TRC) Calls to Action - An Introduction and Updates* presentation, on Wednesday September 29th. It was in recognition of the first federal statutory holiday, National Day for Truth and Reconciliation, on September 30th, which was Call to Action #80. It was also a continuation of Canada's road to reconciliation, from the diocesan presentation on National Indigenous People's Day on June 21st. The goal for this presentation was to introduce members to four of the 94 Calls to Action for future discussions at their councils, to generate ideas as League members to keep us and others accountable to stay active in the reconciliation process. There were 132 members from across the diocese including executive members from the

The ladies along with all the parishioners who attended Mass that weekend dropped off a total of 6 skids of nonperishable food items to be sent to Haiti. The BLITZ FOOD DRIVE got under way when the members learned that Dr. Simone's "CANADIAN FOOD FOR CHILDREN" was shipping out a container to Haiti that Wednesday. Short following notice "Call to Action", but the ladies spread the word and got great results. We thanked God for the beautiful sunny weather making it easier to collect outside

CWL St Patrick's Council (Markham), North York Region

The CWL Easter Fundraiser turned out to be a surprising success, despite the restrictions presented by the pandemic.

Community partners and supporters came together to support the mission.

The Campaign pre-sold potted white Easter Lilies and colorful Hydrangeas, reached out to fellow parishioners, friends and local businesses who readily opened their hearts, some making generous donations. The delivery event was held at the Valleyview premises on March 28th and 30th, 2021. With the proceeds, the campaign was able to give 60 food gift cards to the Society of St. Vincent de



Paul serving needy families and individuals in the St. Patrick's and Blessed Frederic Ozanam Parishes. For years the council conducted Easter meal project serving a special dinner for senior residents at Markham Cedarcrest Manor. This year due to COVID19 restrictions the project switched to providing pre-packaged meals, prepared by T&T Café at Main Street Markham, good for 25 senior residents. A CWL member-volunteer delivered the meals to the home on April 6th adding with the meals her own Easter gift of goodies and inspirational card. Part of the proceeds also went towards providing food and hygiene supplies to the Markham Food Bank.

Good Shepherd Council, North York Region

MaterCare International has been one of Good Shepherd CWL's favourite charity, an organization of Catholic Health Professionals dedicated to the care of mothers and babies. The council holds a 'Toonie' 50-50 draw at each of their meetings, with half the proceeds going to Matercare and half to the winner of the draw. A few months ago, Mary Williams, a 40-year member, had a wonderful idea. She knitted one hundred darling Covid Kids and Angels and brought them to Mass asking for a donation of \$5 each. A card was also placed inside each box which read: "Perhaps you could find a special place for this little Covid Doll to remind you of the many blessings you have received from God during this difficult period."

CELEBRATES 100 YEARS


100 years ago on April 21, 1921, St. Mary's CWL was officially chartered, only one year after National CWL formed. Over the century, thousands of St. Mary's female parishioners

have eagerly participated in service to God, Canada and abroad through their membership.

In the 1920s, members were involved in raising money for a new church floor after the Ku Klux Klan attempted to blow up the old St. Mary's church. In the 1940s, members were patriotically sewing and knitting for the Red Cross during the 2nd World War and holding dances and garden party fund raisers. Past traditions such as the bazaar, public speaking contests, donations to a variety of charities and lobbying the government regarding ethical issues continue to this day.

In more recent times, they have donated to such worthy causes as: The Women's and Children's Shelter of Barrie, Gilda's Club, Candlelighters for children with cancer, funding education for African women and sponsoring priests. They donated a defibrillator to the parish and In the Year of Mercy, the council purchased the Divine Mercy picture that presently hangs inside the church. Changes have occurred but they have and will always enjoy gathering for good food and good company. Even now, during the pandemic, they continue to meet on Zoom to pray and laugh together.

During this anniversary year they added a commemorative plaque to the maple tree planted last fall, created a Facebook page and website, posting daily prayers, a calendar of events plus articles and pictures from their past reminding members of how far they've come. An anniversary banner was created to be displayed in the church entrance. Plans have been made for a celebratory Mass and luncheon to be enjoyed when Covid restrictions permit a relaxed and carefree setting.

St. John's Council, Toronto Region

The council continued to connect members in various way while still not able to meet in person.

During a 28 day 'cycle' in June, members collect menstruation products for marginalized and homeless girls and women. The Period Purse is a non-profit group that "strives to achieve menstrual equity and reduce the stigma surrounding periods".



The council continued providing monthly donations of lunch items for the Good Shepherd Centre and held collection of dry goods for a senior's food bank. Their monthly enewsletters keep members informed, also used personal ways by asking members to share favourite hymns, prayers, saints, songs, etc. with an explanation as to why it is a favourite; each month has a different share theme. They are also praying the Rosary via Zoom every Friday evening. St. John's council turned 70 this year and members are looking forward to celebrating that milestone when they can gather in person once again, the party will be the springboard to launching them back into action again!





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Although there may be different duties and responsibilities required in the above noted positions, the skill sets required tend to be the same in these two positions. These

skill sets may include, but are not limited to the following:

Communication: excellent written and verbal communication skills help them work as a valued member of the executive at all levels.

Time Management: helps plan her own work, and often can assist others on the executive with their schedules. She must also be able to work independently and be able to prioritize her duties and responsibilities.

Organization: The main skill required of both is remaining organized. By doing so, she can use this skill to easily access information, files, etc. both for herself and for others on the executive.

Computer literacy: Since both the administrative assistant and corresponding secretary complete most of their work on computers, computer literacy is essential. She should not be afraid to learn different platforms and/or software needed or used by her council.

Teamwork: Since both the administrative assistant and corresponding may interact with all members the executive, she should have excellent teamwork skills to collaborate with others and create a positive environment.

A good administrative assistant or corresponding secretary will:

- 1. Be organized
- 2. Keep copies of all correspondence
- 3. Respect confidentiality
- 4. Work closely with the President
- 5. Make it easy for others to take over by keeping clear records
- 6. Prepare for meetings well in advance
- 7. Be able to summarize effectively
- 8. Keep people informed

And always remember: "There is no 'i' in 'team'.

Reaching out to Members

- Choose a time, weekly, when members will pray the rosary together from their homes
- Consider a project where members can work from home, such as, knitting items or collecting socks for the needy
- Have a short, outdoor meeting on a nice day
- Have a drive-by visit with members, especially the elderly
- Hold a "take-out meal" fund-raising event, with pre-orders and where pick-up times are scheduled

Our members need to know that the League continues to function and there are ways they can continue to be actively involved.

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Consciously supporting consideration of a vocation to religious life by our children

Hearing a story recently of a Catholic Women's League sister's 3 sons being called to a religious vocation, it made me start to wonder if I as a mother was/am open to a call for my children. Are there things that I should/could do as a mother so that my children are open to a call to single, married, or religious life?

Responding to a religious vocation requires a generous heart willing to commit to following Christ and caring for His sheep in pastoral life. We should consider if we are generous of heart and willing to see our son or daughter commit to religious life.

Some of us look forward to having grandchildren and this may blind us to the possibility of religious life for our children. The generous heart would recognize the Graces that would be received both by children accepting a call to religious life and to their parents. As a parent, we should show our openness to acceptance of a call to any of the three vocations.

Should your child voice an interest in religious life, you should show support by sharing the joy with your child, praying for them, and offering Mass in thanksgiving for their consideration to such a call. Make sure your child recognizes your generosity in seeing him/her considering commitment to Christ.

God gives us the gift of children, but they do not belong to us but to God.

"If they are planning and doing these things merely on their own, it will soon be overthrown. But if it is from God, you will not be able to overthrow them. You may even find yourselves fighting against God!" (Acts 5:38-39).

The paragraph below is from St. Michael Catholic Community blog on child religious vocations.

We are always complaining about the lack of vocations. If we had a faith the size of a mustard seed and we were generous in the ways our children want to be generous, how could there be any doubt that we'd have many religious and priest vocations? Let us allow ourselves to receive and share the grace with joy (and without fear), because "what no eye has seen, nor ear heard, nor human heart conceived, what God has prepared for those who love him." (1 Cor, 2-9)

Promotion of Per Capita Fee Increase

At the recent national fall meeting there was a reiteration of concerns for the need to increase national per capita fees. The following is a fact sheet prepared by National Secretary-Treasurer Marie Rackley.

FACTS:

- 1. It has been 10 years since the last increase in National per capita fee increase.
- 2. 8 out of the past 10 years we have had an operating deficit.
- 3. Investment income and sale of investments have covered out operating deficit.
- 4. Increase in expenses have continued to affect our deficit: facility cost, supplies, conventions, travel, salaries, league promotion magazine cost.
- 5. Decrease in membership over the last 3 years has been close to 12,000 for avariety of reasons.
- 6. Covid has made its mark on our League by distancing our members from oneother but also from our parish, diocesan, and national councils.
- 7. The younger generation of Catholics are frustrated and upset with the church today and are not playing an active role in our church community.

Solutions

- 1. In 2017-2018 talks began to develop a Strategic Plan to revise and change the format of the Catholic Women's League of Canada. Motion was made to invest \$1,000,000 from the investment fund to cover this 5-year project. This would not affect the financial operation of the League
- 2. It is time for the League to invest in its membership at all levels. The Welcome Program was developed and needs to be promoted with the parish councils through the leadership of the Provincial Presidents. It is time for the National Executive to invest in their Provincial Counterparts so that they are informed of all information and changes and can pass it along to the Diocesan counterparts
- 3. The Board of Directors have already started to make the tough decisions and look at conserving expenses. The reduction of two printed copies of our League magazine and is it time to make another tough decision by having a in person National Convention every other year and having a virtual National convention the opposite year
- 4. Support is needed from our Spiritual Advisors. Is it time for the Bishops in the various dioceses in the provinces to reach out and support the League by speaking to their



parish pastors and asking them to be part of our great organization? We need to invite the ladies from our church community withour Parish Priest standing next to our Parish / Provincial President. We need to show that we are a strong spiritual organization rooted in gospel values and support God's people. We the Catholic Women's League of Canada playa vital role in the Catholic church as confirmed by the Canadian Conference of Catholic Bishops

- 5. Expenses can be reduced but not affect the operations of an efficient office.
- There is only one place to look and that is to increase revenue. The solution is per capita fees. The \$12 increase on 65,000 members would give us \$780,000 extra in fees for 2023. With this increase we would be able to:
 - a. Begin returning to investments the dollars that we have used to operate the league.
 - b. Continue to invest in leadership training within each province.
 - c. Encourage our Board to reach out to their counter parts within theprovinces and have virtual meetings.
 - d. Increase grants to the provinces for provincial workshops.
 - e. Could we return to 3 copies of our magazine?

Responsibility

This is our responsibility, the Board members of the League, to provide the information to our members on why we need an increase in per capita fees. What is negative must become positive. We accepted this responsibility when we offered our name to service on National level and were elected by the membership to service and protect our League. There are ways we can work together to help with the \$12.00 increase, as was conveyed in my Communique.

We as a Board have to "Walk the Talk:




