HOSPICE PALLIATIVE CARE

Members are asked to participate in the **12** Hours of Prayer for Palliative Care CWL initiative from **May 1 to 7, 2022**. ** More information is forthcoming from our national chairperson on the national website (<u>www.cwl.ca</u>).

Begin thinking of ways to **publicize** and to **participate** in this important initiative. We can ask our spiritual advisors, members (including those who are homebound), parishioners, family, friends, and co-workers to pray for its success ... and we can use calling lists or email, texting, tweeting and Facebook to get the word out.

Consider a mass intention to recognize the need for quality hospice palliative care.

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As the snow continues to fall, Spring might seem far off; however, as the month of May approaches, so does the League's annual **12 Hours of Prayer for Palliative Care** initiative during the week of **May 1st to 7th, 2022.** Palliative care is defined as "*an approach that improves the quality of life of patients and their families facing the problems associated with life-threatening illness through the prevention and early identification and impeccable assessment and treatment of pain and other problems psychosocial or spiritual*" (WHO 2002, page 83).

Catholics have been leaders in providing quality and compassionate health care in Canada not just for years but for centuries. In fact, ... "the first Hotel Dieu in New France was established in 1639 by 3 sisters of Augustines de la Miséricorde de Jésus in Québec City." By 1694, Hotel Dieu in Montréal had been constructed



(<u>https://www.thecanadianencyclopedia.ca/en/article/hospital</u>). In 2018, there were 30 Catholic healthcare facilities in Canada with a combined 353 palliative care beds (CCCB letter to Venetia Lawless - July 23, 2018 (<u>https://www.cccb.ca/wp-content/uploads/2018/08/palliative care submission for health canada en.pdf</u>). This is a legacy requiring our continued support and prayers to ensure we can expand on the compassionate care patients who face life-threatening illness so desperately need.

If you or anyone you know is providing care for a loved one suffering with a critical condition, it can be overwhelming. Faith, prayer, and support are our strongest foundations to aid us on the journey. The ideal scenario would be for palliative care to begin alongside curative treatments soon after diagnosis of a condition that may be life-limiting (Dr. Pippa Hawley - head of Division of Palliative Care, University of British Columbia); however, three out of five Canadian primary care physicians do not feel well prepared to help people in need of palliative care (<u>https://www.cihi.ca/en/palliative-care-in-canada-inconsistent-patients-say</u>). This supportive care is not required to be provided strictly in the hospital, however. Many individuals, if given the opportunity and provided with the proper support, would prefer to receive care in their own home.

In 2019, Health Canada developed the Action Plan on Palliative Care which outlines a 5year plan to address the issues surrounding the provision of quality care both in hospital and in the individual home

The Canadian Conference of Catholic Bishops created *Horizons of Hope: a Toolkit for Catholic Parishes on Palliative Care* that offers support and guidance for those dealing with palliation and/or end of life decisions (<u>https://www.cccb.ca/faith-moral-issues/suffering-and-end-of-life/horizons-of-hope-a-toolkit-for-catholic-parishes-on-palliative-care/</u>).

As we approach the 3rd year of the pandemic, it has never been more important to pray for an increase in funding for palliative care and to support compassionate care of patients facing end-of-life care or requiring care for severe illness.

This May, we will take part in the **12 Hours of Prayer for Palliative Care**. Visit the national website (<u>www.cwl.ca</u>) for ideas on how to promote events in your parish (if restrictions permit) and remember, "God has a weakness for the prayers of his people. Indeed, prayer is man's greatest power. Therefore, we must never tire of knocking at the door of God's heart and asking for help. For God is a relentless warrior when he is called upon to defend his people." (Pope Francis – Nov. 16, 2013)

LAND ACKNOWLEDGEMENTS

I was recently asked for information about land acknowledgements. The questions mainly pertained to the why and how. Therefore, I thought it might be helpful if I shared some of these questions with you in case other councils have similar concerns.

What is land acknowledgement?

Land acknowledgements are an honest and historically accurate way to recognize the traditional First Nations, **Métis**, and Inuit territories of a place. All land acknowledgements have one goal and that is to <u>recognize</u> and <u>respect</u> the Indigenous Peoples as the original custodians of the land and territory and to commemorate their kinship to the land.

Why are land acknowledgements necessary?

Firstly, it might be helpful to recognize that land acknowledgements are not new and have been used at CWL meetings, conventions, and gatherings for the past several years. They were inspired by the *94 Calls-to-Action* published in the Truth and Reconciliation Commission of Canada report in 2015. They are a necessary first step toward honoring the original occupants of a place.

What is the League's position on land acknowledgements?

Another question that has often been asked, what is National's policy on this matter. In the *National Manual of Policy and Procedure*, Page 81 Meetings General, it states the following:

Councils at all levels should acknowledge territory before all meetings, conventions, and gatherings. i.e., "We acknowledge that we are on treaty (#) territory and the traditional homeland of the (insert 22 first nation) and the Métis nation, where applicable".

Therefore, this is a practice that should be followed at the start of all meetings.

What version of land acknowledgement should we use?

Over the past few years, I have seen several versions of the land acknowledgement. Some are very specific to their territory and some more general depending on the attendees, especially now that we are hosting more far-reaching audiences via ZOOM etc.

There are many examples available online. Certainly, if one example speaks to you more than another, then feel free to adapt it for your group. Bottom-line, land acknowledgements are a starting place for change in how the land is seen and talked about.

And finally, we should all keep in mind that the ancestral traditional lands of the Indigenous Peoples' is a common home to everyone by virtue of the gracious gift of God Our Creator.
