Living in Northern Ontario, I have the opportunity to experience the beautiful and the not so beautiful aspects of the four seasons; the bountiful bugs who harass you but also pollinate the beautiful wild blueberries, and raspberries; the nasty cold temperatures that produces beautiful snow so that you can ski and snowshoe; and the unpredictable spring and fall frost that tests your gardening expertise. Topics could include: Role of women in the church, the lay ministries, the goals set out by our bishop, the curriculum in our catholic schools; and what influenced them to

enter the priesthood; we have many priests in our diocese who were not born in Canada and the CWL members would be very interested in the practices in other countries.

Gardeners work hard and deserve praise and recognition for their efforts. Parishes in our diocese are acknowledging the fruitfulness of members by delivering gratitude bags containing a greeting card, some chocolates, cookies and tea. These will be hand delivered, this summer, at a time when the visit can take place outdoors. There are some members, we have not seen since the start of the pandemic, what a happy reunion it will be for those that have been isolating.

Gardening is essentially a solitary activity. It's just you, the sun, the dirt, and the plants. Enjoy your garden, big or small, and God will use your garden to teach you all kinds of lessons.
