Membership Fees

No one wants to pay more for anything but sometimes we know that we are getting value for our money and feel it is money well-spent. Have you ever bought an item of clothing, knowing it was worth the asking-price, because it was of great quality, was a timeless fashion and would serve you for years? Many see the Catholic Women's League in that way. When we pay our annual membership, we find quality, timeless rewards and are well-served.

As League members we are part of the largest of group of Catholic women in Canada, but also Catholic women in the world through WUCWO (World Union of Catholic Women's Organizations). All these women are our sisters and are offering their prayers for us. Our views are represented through resolutions, letters and visits to government. Collectively, we are a strong voice of thousands, rather the lone voice of one individual.

It has been 10 years since the National has increased their fees. In that time expenses have increased for the office, supplies, conventions, salaries, League promotion and the printing and mailing of the magazine. The only source of revenue for National is their portion of the membership fees (per capita) and membership has dropped by 12,000 in just the last three years! The Board of Directors has reduced expenses to save costs. One of them is by printing two issues of the League magazine and having the third issue on line. Other measures have also been implemented.

No further increases are expected in the near future by either national or provincial councils.

Councils can find ways to offset the membership increase. A council could hold a fund-raising event and supplement part of the membership costs. Another idea would be to offer an "adopt a member", where a well-to-do member adds an extra \$12 to her membership fee to help another who is unable to pay the increase. We need to be creative and positive.

Let us live our provincial theme, "Go Make a Difference!" in the lives of our League sisters.




Reminder to look at the website for Personal Letter Writing Guide

• A letter represents 50 to 500 taxpayers who didn't bother to write **State clearly that you are writing as a private or concerned citizen.**Do not use your CWL council letterhead or the recipient might assume you are writing for the entire council letter head may only be used by an executive when wiring officially.

Legislation Directive #2 will have a sample letter regarding Resolutions ON.22.01 Improve Care in Long-term Care Homes and Forms and Address.

October We celebrate Thanksgiving.

The first nationwide Canadian Thanksgiving was celebrated in 1859, long before it became an official nationwide holiday in 1957. As Christians, Thanksgiving in Canada is religious for us and it's a day for our families to gather, spend time together, appreciate what we have, and give thanks and praise for all of our blessings.

Sanctity of Life

The prophetic papal encyclical Evangelium vitae (The Gospel of Life) was written by Pope St. John Paul II in 1995 to reaffirm the value and inviolability of every human life and to appeal to all people to respect, protect, love, and serve every human life.

The Gospel of Life is at the heart of Jesus' saving message to the world. Through the Incarnation and birth of Christ, God reveals to us the dignity of all human life. Human life, as a gift of God, is sacred and inviolable. Direct attacks on human life, such as abortion and euthanasia, are always unacceptable. Yet, sadly we see new and expanding threats to human life emerging on an alarming scale. These new threats to life are often justified, protected, and even promoted by our laws and culture. Not only must human life not be taken, but it must be protected with loving concern.

We have an opportunity to demonstrate our beliefs about the value and sacredness of life. Life Chain is a peaceful and prayerful public witness of pro-life individuals standing for 90 minutes praying for our nation and for an end to abortion. It is a visual statement of solidarity by the Christian community that abortion kills children and that the church supports the sanctity of human life from the moment of conception until natural death. Life Chain is held simultaneously in more than 200 locations across Canada each year. Please mark your calendar for Sunday, October 2, 2022 from 2- 3 pm in most locations. Life is precious - protect it.

Faith In Action Project – "Go Make a Difference!" - Vocations

Our provincial president Linda Squarzolo has asked each chairperson to develop a Faith into Action project that helps us to live her theme "Go Make a Difference!

In the light of all the issues surrounding the church (abuse, indigenous issues, etc.) and recognizing that our priests, religious and deaconate must deal with personal stress related to same, I would like the focus for Christian Family Life Standing Committee to be directed towards "Vocations"

I would ask that each parish council consider doing 1 or 2 of the suggested actions listed in the Action Plan.

Action Plan:

- 1. Offer a Mass for the intentions of your pastor.
- 2. Offer a Mass for the intention for young persons to discern a vocation to the priesthood or persons in religious life.
- 3. Offer a Mass for the intentions of any/all persons in religious life.
- 3. Invite priests and religious to speak at your meetings on vocations.
- 4. Send a "thinking of you card" or a "thank you" to your pastor and/or persons in religious life.
- 5. Remember to congratulate them on their anniversaries. Some ideas include: send a card of congratulations, offer a Mass, have a "come and go", offer a spiritual bouquet.
- 6. Remember them on special occasions with a card/present: Christmas, Easter, etc.
- 7. Offer an invitation to your home for a meal or a visit.
- 8. Discuss vocations with your children, grandchildren and friends.
- 9. Donate to the Bishop F. Pappin Bursary Fund Donations sent to provincial treasurer with the cheque made payable to the Ontario Provincial Council of The Catholic Women's League of Canada. Note Bishop Bernard F. Pappin Bursary in the memo line.
- 10. Share information about the Bishop Pappin Bursary Fund with your parish council.
- 11. Share information about the Bishop Pappin Bursary Fund with any seminarians you may know.
- 12. Adopt a seminarian or novitiate. Send him/her a card or note of encouragement during their studies. Send a Christmas card, invite them for a meal. Invite them to come to a meeting and speak about their journey.
- 13. Pray often for a specific priest or religious or any/all priests and persons in the religious life.
- 14. Pray for vocations.

PRAYER FOR VOCATIONS

Lord Jesus Christ, You took to Yourself a body and soul like ours, to teach us the glory of self-sacrifice and service. Mercifully instill in our hearts the desire to dedicate our lives to You. Give us priests and deacons to stand at the altar and to speak the words of the gospel; brothers and sisters to teach the young, nurse the sick and minister charity to all; lay people to imitate You in their hearts, families, work and community. Amen

"Orange Shirt Day is also commemorated on September 30th, and individuals are encouraged to wear an orange shirt to promote the concept of "Every Child Matters."

The orange shirt has become a symbol of the stripping away of culture, freedom and self-esteem experienced by Indigenous children over generations."

The Importance of Listening

My sister and I spent what is looking like an annual trip to a nearby lake, to visit cousins on our mother's side of the family. It's a way to reconnect and catch up on family news that has accumulated over the past year.

Of course, we always come home with something that evokes further reflection. This time it came in a comment from our cousin's son. He listens and engages in the conversation, although it takes a bit more time for him to articulate his ideas. He's a baseball fan and was up on all of the recent trade activities with the Toronto Blue Jays. He also likes to keep up with some of the politics of the day and obviously watches Question Period when the federal house is in session. What he said and what struck me was his comment about what he liked about watching Question Period. He said he liked how the member asking the question was able to finish the question or comment uninterrupted before an answer was given back. Here is a young man who has the ability to discern the importance of listening and of being silent while the speaker has a chance to express his or her thoughts. As a person with Down Syndrome, he is all too aware of the challenges in having his own words heard. He, too, has thoughts that need to be heard and appreciated.

During our visit to the cottage, we were all engaged in telling our stories - sometimes in quick volley and sometimes over the voice of another. I'm hoping we gave Luke the time to express his thoughts to us. And I hope we paid enough attention to him when he did engage in conversation. When we headed home, we received a warm handshake and a big hug so I guess we were on the right track.

What began as a lesson for Communication has morphed into something much more expansive. Listening touches on most aspects of Community Life. Listening and letting voices be heard sits at the foundation of ensuring respect and dignity of all persons regardless of their race, religion, physical or mental abilities, and those living on the peripheries. Listening is one of the three basic goals of the Truth and Reconciliation Working Group – Learning, Listening, Actioning. Everyone deserves their voice to be heard but we can't hear those voices if we aren't listening and that requires both our silence and attention.

FAITH, SERVICE AND SOCIAL JUSTICE

In 2021, The Catholic Women's League of Canada underwent a strategic renewal. The League reviewed the existing standing committees and reduced them to three to align with core values of faith, service and social justice.

The League's purpose is "uniting Catholic women to grow in faith, and to promote social justice through service to the church, Canada and the world." Through the core values of faith, service and social justice, members are called to live the Mission Statement to "grow in faith, and to witness to the love of God through ministry and service."

The envisioned future of the League is that through the work of these three standing committees, "The Catholic Women's League of Canada will become an inclusive and engaged community of Catholic women inspired by faith." The members will be vital participants in the church, valued partners for social justice, respected advocates at all government levels and connected to the world.

Faith (Hearts in Prayer) "Uniting Catholic Women to Grow in Faith"



Spiritual development is the essence of the Catholic Women's League. The League was established in 1920 as a lay organization of Catholic women who worked and advocated for social justice but who also valued their spiritual development. The League was officially recognized by the Canadian Conference of Catholic Bishops as a lay association of women in 1948.

Councils at all levels are encouraged to provide opportunities for members to experience spiritual growth through:

- Prayer: communal and individual (meaningful liturgies, spiritual programs, retreats, days of reflection, prayer with scripture)
- Recognizing the sanctity of life: "Respect for life and the dignity of the human person extends also to all God's creation, which is called to join with us in praising God" (St. Pope John Paul II, World Day of Peace Message, 1990). Members are called to be people of life (from conception to natural death) and for all life at all times.
- Study of Catholic teachings (papal documents, courses, programs, guest speakers, workshops, videos, subscriptions to Catholic newspapers, periodicals and other publications)
- Awareness of the role of women in the church (theology of all creation, call to evangelization, involvement in lay liturgical ministries, support of the missionary work of the church)
- Encouraging vocations (supporting parish priests, formation programs for young women and men, youth ministries)
- Ecumenism and interfaith endeavours (Week of Prayer for Christian Unity, World Day of Prayer)
- Study and implement the action plans of adopted resolutions that pertain to faith and the Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms (pro-life legislation, reproductive technology, euthanasia); circulating information that enhances church teachings.

Service (Hands That Share) "Service to the Church, Canada and the World"



"Just as the Son of Man came not to be served but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many." (Mt. 20:25). The Catholic Women's League of Canada and its members provide service to those in need, their parish, their local community, the country and the world. The League Prayer includes the words, "... teach us to share with others at home and abroad..." The League is known and valued for this service. Individuals and councils address the corporal works of mercy.

Through service, members are encouraged to:

- Provide/coordinate volunteer activities/projects of the council in service of members, the parish or the community
- Develop services to help in the areas of homelessness, human trafficking, poverty, bullying, racism, etc.
- Support food banks and soup kitchens, serve funeral receptions
- Invite guest speakers to educate members about charitable needs in the local community, the country and abroad
- Educate members about issues relating to restrictions to providing service such as summer jobs applications, criteria restrictions for peaceful witnessing
- Study and implement the action plans of adopted resolutions that pertain to service

Social Justice (Minds That Dare) "Actively Involved in Society"



"The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to bring good news to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim release to the captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to let the oppressed go free, to proclaim the year of the Lord's favour" Luke 4:18,19

In its envisioned future, The Catholic Women's League of Canada sets out to be a respected advocate at all government levels. Social justice, as one of the three fundamental core values,

is critical in supporting this endeavour and is vital to accomplishing several Objects of the League. Exemplifying the Christian ideals by upholding and defending Christian education and values, protecting the sanctity of human life, recognizing human dignity of all people and contributing to the understanding and growth of religious freedom are all foundational in achieving social justice. This is the core value that facilitates the League affecting change in areas like policies and legislation within various levels of government.

Through social justice endeavours, members will:

- Participate in activities that uphold the life and dignity of the human person
- Be mindful of the poor and vulnerable, show concern for their needs and advocate for their complete inclusion in society
- Become involved in advocating for the dignity of work and the rights of workers
- * Recognize and uphold the principle that with rights come responsibilities
- Understand that we are one human family and are called to global solidarity as God's people
- Promote peace in parishes, communities and elsewhere
- Demonstrate care for God's creation
- Know the local, provincial and federal government representatives in their areas
- Keep informed on issues concerning the League
- Study and implement the action plans of adopted resolutions that pertain to social justice and the Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms (freedom of religion, end-of-life legislation, support for the vulnerable, etc.)
- Educate members and keep them informed of all relevant social justice issues

National Convention Report

The beautiful Okanagan lakeside was the amazing setting for the much-anticipated 102nd National Convention. It was obvious from the moment of arrival that everyone was very excited to be meeting in person once again. Not only were delegates warmly greeted at the airport but throughout the following days. Those attending external events, organized for the Saturday and Sunday, expressed positive comments. Throughout the convention, everyone could see the planning committee's attention to the little details. Sunflowers, the official flower for Kelowna, were everywhere. A "Guess How Many Sunflowers at Convention" contest revealed that there were 620 in total. The opening mass was celebrated at the Immaculate Conception Parish on the Vigil of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary. The opening ceremonies were followed with a wine and cheese reception hosted by the Knights of Columbus.

Monday morning began with Archbishop Emeritus Martin Currie, former National Spiritual Advisor, celebrating mass on the Feast of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary. When the business sessions began, National President Fran Lucas' opening remarks included the focus on building relationships and making connections with old and new friends.

The Ribbons of Love initiative, with more than 1100 blue and yellow ribbons prepared by the provinces, was displayed in a huge heart shape at the back of the hall. Fran invited everyone to take two ribbons, one for themselves and one to gift to another. Greetings were given by representatives from World Union of Catholic Women (WUCWO), the national Ukrainian President and the Women's Inter-Church Council of Canada, the Euthanasia Prevention Coalition and Catholic Missions in Canada. The day continued with reports from the provincial presidents and national officers.

National President-Elect Shari Guinta outlined all the new resources available on the website, specifically mentioning The Joy of Leadership, the Welcome Program and Embracing Diversity. Shari also announced that the Life Membership moratorium has been lifted. Changes and more information will be communicated in September. Executive Director Kim Scammel, Executive Director detailed the roles and responsibilities of the National Office staff. Since Marie Rackley, National treasurer was unable to attend, Kim reviewed the financial reports. The amendment to increase the per capita vote was carried with a vote of 7 to 4. This increase will become effective January 2023. Marie Rackley will be providing "talking points" to help councils communicate the increase to their members.

During discussions, it was learned that Saskatchewan provincial council has developed training videos for spiritual advisors. These training resources will be shared with National Spiritual Advisor Bishop Jensen. The hope is that these resources will be adapted and made available for all.

The day ended with the commissioning ceremony of the 2020 and 2021 new life members.

On Monday evening members finally got to celebrate the 100th CWL Anniversary appropriately with a Roaring 20's themed dinner. Creative costumes, decorations, big band music and the official cake cutting all made for a fun-packed evening.

Tuesday began with mass, celebrated by National Spiritual Advisor Bishop Stephen Jensen. The collection of \$5,109.45 was divided between the CCCB Ukrainian Relief Fund and Rachel's Vineyard Retreat which offers post-abortion support.

Following the mass, Honorary Life Member Barbara Dowding presented "The Art of Accompaniment". Who better to accompany us than Jesus? She explored how to intentionally walk with someone, even someone you don't like and the freedom that comes when you truly listen. She pointed out that the League is connected to the past but with eyes on the future. The highlight of the presentation was the sharing of stories of accompaniment by Honorary Life Members. There was not a dry eye in the hall as they spoke about who had been there to accompany them and who had made a difference in their lives.

Points that resonated included:

- "How many times do you smile when you talk about the League?"
- HLM Marie Cameron's quote "If it's meant to be, then it's up to me!" and
- Mary, Our Blessed Mother, is our model for accompanying.

The afternoon speaker was Author Elizabeth Tomlin, the author of *Joyful Momentum*, *Growing Vibrant*, *Faith-Filled Women's Group*. Her presentation was also on accompaniment. She spoke about the importance of faith-based groups for women, the intrinsic need to share and be part of a community. Her presentation included many personal stories about her own experiences of accompaniment. She reviewed the Marks of Vocation; Certain, Joyful, Steadfast, Evangelistic and Sacrificial. She reminded us that our vocation is evangelistic by reaching out to someone and sacrificial when we refuse to quit because it's hard.

Wednesday began with the presentation "The League of the Future – Year 4" by National President-Elect Shari Guinta. Shari, along with the goal leads Christa Grillmaur, Jacqueline Nogier, Sr. Susan Scott and Sharon Cieben, gave a strategic planning progress report. Much work has been done and each presenter stressed the tools, resources, workshops and videos now available on the national website. In total there are 21 working groups, 84 members, who, to date, have logged 15,922 hours of work. National Community Life Chair Faith Anderson reported on the status of CWL projects and the many contributions from members. She reported that 36,378 lbs of food had been collected for food banks. Also of note, were the monetary presentations made to the voluntary funds: \$13,123.70 to Development and Peace, \$10, 680.45 to CNEWA and approximately \$21K to Catholic Missions in Canada. The eleven applicants for the National Bursary received a total of \$7,900.

Faith also made reference to the new brochure for CNEWA (#350), available on the CWL website, and that the D&P brochure (#352) is currently under revision.

National Resolutions Chair Rolande Chernichan presented the resolution *Enact Federal Legislation to Reduce Food Loss and Waste* gifted by Alberta Mackenzie Provincial Council. After much discussion the resolution was adopted. The resolution *National Strategy to Address Loneliness*, gifted by Ontario Provincial Council, was forwarded to National Education and Health Chair Margaret Schwab to communicate and action this important topic.

All proposed amendments to the Constitution & Bylaws were approved with near unanimous votes, except for the change of Our Patroness, which was defeated 10 to 1.

Manitoba was the only province to vote in favour. All changes are effective January 1, 2023.

The 2023 National Convention will be an annual meeting of members, hosted by St. John, New Brunswick. The focus will be on two days of business sessions with reduced event activities and no keynote speakers. Attendance will be by invitation only and will include national officers, voting delegates, provincial and diocesan accredited delegates, honorary life members and life members.

The final registration report for the 102^{nd} National CWL Convention included a total of 462 members in attendance.

The CWL will be instrumental at this parish in the building of a new church for the diocese.


