During the seasons of Advent and Christmas, we carry on traditions that our families have embraced throughout the years. As a first-generation Canadian of Croatian descent, I am always learning about customs of my ancestors. On St. Lucy's Day, December 13, it is a practice in Croatia and other European nations, to plant a small amount of wheat. The wheat grains are placed in a dish or plate of soil and watered. The container is kept in a warm spot and the soil moist, allowing the seeds to germinate. By Christmas the shoots will be several inches high, reminding us of the New Life born in Bethlehem. On Christmas Eve, as we celebrate the birth of the Christ Child, the plant will be tied with a ribbon and candles placed in the centre, symbolizing the "Light of Christ".

My wish for you is to have a blessed Advent and Christmas, surrounded by the love of family and friends, knowing you are loved by God and all your League sisters.

Tips on How to Grow your own Christmas Wheat

If you'd like to grow your own, you need just a few things, like a **little plastic cup or ramekin dish**, a **little dirt or potting soil**, about an inch deep, and **raw hard winter wheat seeds** enough to line your container. (I usually just grab some dirt from the garden or a planter outside I have and get about a cup of raw seeds at a grocery store that typically sells nuts and grains from bulk containers.)



Soaking the wheat seeds overnight can give them a nice head start, especially if you don't have a warm, sunny window to keep them in while they grow. Plant the seeds, lightly covered in damp soil, and **keep them very moist, but not drenched**. Don't let the seeds and soil dry out, especially as the seeds are germinating. They'll need more water as they grow, but usually I start with a few spoons of water a day to maintain even moisture.

It's a **great prayer activity for kids** to plant and watch the wheat grow, like a little image of themselves, that they can place next to baby Jesus on Christmas day, and one day envision being transformed into Him. Great First Communion mediation activity too.

A simple prayer as you water them and watch them grow can be, "Lord help me to surrender my life into your hands and be renewed with Your Spirit." or, "Help me to see that I am nothing without Your Love" or, "Help me to see You transforming me when I receive You in the Eucharist" or, "Help me trust that I can surrender my life to You completely."

If you miss the 13th, don't worry! Christmas is a 'season'. (I actually plant several rounds to keep fresh shoots going throughout the traditional 40 days of Christmas feasting until the last Christmas feast day of The Presentation on the 2nd of February! And yes, I have my Christmas lights out that long!) So you have time! And... you may even find 'wheat grass' sold in the produce section of your local grocery or health food store. If you can't find it but you see them selling other micro greens, just ask them about ordering 'wheat grass that is still growing' (vs. cut) and they might be able to order it for you for their next delivery. Then just display it in your favorite little planter in your nativity or on your table, and keep watering it.;-)

Many blessings to you as you meditate on this special devotion.

At the Rally in Cornwall, the Indigenous women from St. Regis participated in reciting one decade and singing hymns in Mohawk. The Diocese is working on including and learning from our Indigenous neighbors.

The Diocesan Council is very excited and working hard towards welcoming everyone to our diocese next year in July for the Provincial Convention.

It is a joy to be back together in person. The amazing things that our small diocese has done through the year with helping the Food Banks, to reaching out to our sisters in the League, we are Making a Difference. Our Diocese has kept the faith and is continuing to do the works that we are called to do with Our Lady of Good Counsel watching over us. Wishing each and every one and your families a spirit filled Advent, a wonderful Christmas and all the best in the New Year.






Annual Reports


Youth and campus ministry/outreach



This month, we wish to highlight the national resolutions under the Community Life Standing Committee (found at ... https://cwl.ca/resolutions/by-position/#CL).



2013.01 Building Relationships and Partnerships with Canada's Indigenous Peoples (gifted by New Brunswick Provincial Council)

The **Resolved** clauses asked, "That national council ... urge the current national executive to:

- Build relationships with indigenous women leaders
- Identify ideas and programs for members through the national standing committees on building or deepening relationships and partnerships with the indigenous peoples of Canada

and encourage all members to reach out to indigenous peoples in our communities".

The **Brief** states, "Since 1951, the League has indicated its support for indigenous peoples with nine resolutions under the community life standing committee".

2016.01 Equal Access to Permanent Resident Status, an Amendment to the *Immigration and Refugee Protection Act* (gifted by Ontario Provincial Council)

The **Resolved** clause asked, "That national council ... urge the federal government to amend the *Immigration and Refugee Protection Act* so that foreign workers may apply for permanent resident status regardless of occupational classification".

The **Resolved** clause asked, "That national council ... urge the federal government to fully implement the *R. v. Gladue* decision by directing the courts of Canada to ensure that Gladue reports are provided to all judges before sentencing Indigenous offenders."

2018.01 Attestation Requirement on Canada Summer Jobs Program

SISTERS TOGETHER in CHRIST PROJECT

The Sisters Together in Christ project, was initiated in the Hearst/Moosonee Diocese in September of 2018 as a way to develop a bond and friendship with our sisters in the northern section of our new diocese. It has been a positive way of sharing and experiencing our spirituality, culture, social justice issues, talents and much more.

Our last visit took place over the June 10-13th weekend. Marlene Pavlectic, a former member of our diocese and myself travelled to Moosonee aboard the Polar Bear Express on a beautiful spring day. The first evening, following mass, we were joined by some local women for tea, discussion and review of the weekend plans.

On Saturday morning we participated in a craft/food sale held in the parish hall. 
