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Dear League Members,

I enjoy going to the movies and recently saw "Mother Teresa: No Greater Love". This film tells the story of the life of St. Teresa of Calcutta, her work with the needy and how her missionary work continues today through the Missionaries of Charity.

Anjeze Gonxhe Bojaxhiu was born in Macedonia on August 26, 1910. She joined the Loreto Sisters when she was 18. In 1946 she experienced a "call within a call" to travel to India and help the poorest of the poor. During her lifetime she established hospices to help the blind, disabled, lepers and orphans. She believed, "Every person is Christ for me." When people praised her accomplishments, she stated, "I am a pencil in the hand of God that he wrote love letters to the world with." Her Missionaries of Charity continue to help the less fortunate and have established over 700 houses around the world, called tabernacles for Christ. Following her death in 1997 Mother Teresa's private letters revealed that she felt abandoned by God. Although suffering with this spiritual darkness, she was able to care for the most vulnerable throughout her life. St. Teresa of Calcutta was canonized September 4, 2016.

In her words, "We ourselves feel that what we are doing is just a drop in the ocean. But the ocean would be less because of that missing drop."

Tips for Taking Minutes



It's best to start writing minutes as soon as possible after the meeting. However transparent your notes seemed in the meeting, they won't be nearly as clear 24 hours later, and if you leave them for two weeks you will wonder whether that was actually you in the meeting.

Minutes should follow the order of the agenda. Even if someone revisited a

particular topic later in the meeting, you should include that discussion under the original agenda item. Make sure that you include all the key points made in discussion, any decisions made and actions agreed, together with who is responsible for actions.

Minutes are almost always written in the past tense, and usually in the passive voice ("X set out that y needed to happen; it was agreed that Z would be responsible"). Use 'would' rather than 'will' for what is going to happen, especially with formal minutes.

It is a matter of style whether you use first names, titles plus surnames, or initials to refer to those speaking. Check with the chair, or look at past minutes to see what has been done before, and use the same approach consistently.

Checking and approving. It is always advisable to have one or two trusted people to check the minutes ... this is known as "proof reading". One of these people could be the chair, unless she has asked you to send them to someone else first. Once the minutes have been proof-read and approved by the chair, they can be circulated more widely to the attendees.

Note: Be aware that attendees may wish to correct any errors, and corrections will need to be incorporated in the next set of minutes.

As you are aware, the Christian Family Life Focus project is directed towards "Vocations". In light of that direction, our CFL subcommittee member Audrey Shelton has written up a project called "The Seven Sisters Apostolate" which could be an action easily done by members of any parish council. Please consider this in your 2023 planning.

The Seven Sisters Apostolate

This Apostolate began in 2010 when Janette Howe began to pray more frequently for her pastor. She was praying one Holy Hour a week when it occurred to her that her pastor could benefit so much more if he was prayed for every day of the week. The Mission of the Seven Sisters Apostolate is "Committed prayerful support toward a parish pastor through the assurance of the offering of at least one Holy Hour every day of any given week for that pastor alone – a 'holy wasting', as it were, for the conversion and holiness of that particular priest." Seven Sisters Apostolate pamphlet.

The Apostolate is comprised of seven people who each have a specific day of the week in which they spend an hour in prayer for their pastor. There are usually a few others who are willing to pray the hour if one of the seven cannot. The Anchoress organizes and guides the group of seven. She communicates with their pastor and relates any specific intentions or needs he would like the group to pray for. The commitment to this Apostolate is for a one year period.

Additional groups of seven people from the same parish can pray for their bishop, associate or retired priests.

The hour is ideally prayed in the Presence of the Blessed Sacrament and is prayed strictly for the priest of the parish. This may be accomplished by praying the Rosary, Chaplet of Divine Mercy, Novenas such as to the Sacred Heart of Jesus and other Catholic Prayers. It is recommended that sometime during the hour a prayer be said that the priest may develop a deepening devotion to Mary.

This Apostolate is under the patronage of three saints; Madonna of the Grapes, St. John Vianney and St. Margaret Clitherow.

Priests who have had A Seven Sisters Apostolate in their parish have testified to many blessings arising from the daily Holy Hours and are very thankful for them. More information can be found at **sevensistersapostolate.org.**

To celebrate her leadership, she received the 2016 Clark Award from the University of Windsor. In 2022 Mona Stonefish was honoured by Chief Charles Sampson and Council of Bkejwanong First Nation for her thriving and determination as a residential school survivor.

In her presentation, Mona shared her life experiences to help us better understand the truth of our history and what steps we can take to work towards Reconciliation.

Paddy's Passion

The weather over Christmas in 2022 taught travelers a very valuable lesson, and that is to PREPARE for the weather.

As a volunteer for 15 years with Peterborough/ Northumberland Victim Services, I was taught by the finest OPP and Police in our area. We had an Inspector who believed in our program and would send the volunteers off to OPP headquarters in Barrie to attend several workshops on topics, such as human trafficking, internet exploration, suicides, homicides, home safety, VSS and the list goes on.

Over the next few months, I will share with you some tips and suggestions.

Items to have in your vehicle:

- Always keep a pair of sunglasses (yellow tint-based ones) in the car. Wear these glasses when it is raining or snowing.
- Safety car kit should include a candle in a glass jar, which you can use to heat your car for hours and wooden matches. Remember to open the window slightly when the candle is lit.
- Also have toilet paper, Kleenex, water, a granola bar or small chocolate bars, flashlight, spare flashlight batteries, mitts or gloves, scarf and toque, blanket, pillow and a good book.
- Paper and pen so you can leave a note for the police

It is also recommended that you never keep your phone charger plugged in when not in use.

Next month I will touch on women's safety when driving alone.
