Addressing Food Insecurity

Issues around access and affordability have been more prevalent with the high cost of living. Food insecurity is the inability to acquire or consume an adequate diet quality or sufficient quantity of food in socially acceptable ways, or the uncertainty that one will be able to do so. Household food insecurity is often linked with the household's financial ability to access adequate food. (Health Canada)

Food Insecurity is a serious public health issue in Canada. Statistics Canada's Canadian Income Survey (CIS), in 2022, 18.4% of people in the ten provinces lived in a food-insecure household which, translates to 6.9 million people, including almost 1.8 million children. This is a considerable increase from 2021 with 15.9% of households in the ten provinces, translates to 5.8 million people, including 1.4 million children. PROOF.

Governments and several organizations including the World Union of Catholic Women Organizations (WUCWO) has included the global food crisis as one of their 2023-2027 resolutions. International Day of Awareness on Food Loss and Waste Reduction (Sept. 29)

The issue of food insecurity can also be juxtaposed against high level food loss and waste. This is of concern when so many in and beyond our community go without or does not have enough or quality food to eat. Canadians create over 50 million tonnes of food waste every year despite 60% of it being avoidable through better planning and awareness. The average Canadian household produces 79 kilograms of food waste per year and 47% of food waste in Canada is generated at the household level. Made in Canada Food Waste Statistics in Canada.

"Globally, around 14 percent of food produced is lost between harvest and retail, while an estimated 17 percent of total global food production is wasted (11 percent in households, 5 percent in the food service and 2 percent in retail). When food is lost or wasted, all the resources that were used to produce this food - including water, land, energy, labour and capital - go to waste. In addition, the disposal of food loss and waste in landfills, leads to greenhouse gas emissions, contributing to climate change. Food loss and waste can also negatively impact food security and food availability, and contribute to increasing the cost of food." <u>United Nations International Day of</u> <u>Awareness on Food Loss and Waste Reduction</u>
