This story reported on the annual Cardinal's Dinner which was held in Toronto. Archbishop Francis Leo spoke to the attendees and his message resonated with me,

... March for Life in Ottawa



How Your New Year Resolutions Can Benefit Others

New Year's resolutions are a common practice for many people around the world. The dictionary defines *resolution* as "a firm decision to do or not to do something."

The tradition of making resolutions dates back over 4000 years. The Babylonians, who lived in what is now Iraq, celebrated the New Year during a 12-day festival called Akitu. During this festival, they would make promises to the gods to pay their debts and return borrowed farm equipment. The ancient Romans also made resolutions and eventually they shifted the timing to January 1st with the Julian calendar in 46 B.C.

This new year, as every year, millions of people will have made resolutions promising improvements in their lives. We and the whole world have all been through a lot in the last few years and it feels like the right time to refocus on the things that really matter. Let's use this time to reset and focus not only on resolutions that will benefit ourselves but on resolutions that will benefit others.

The following are some suggested resolutions taken in part from an article by *Jim Mayer,* former executive director of Twin Lakes Senior Living Community.

8 Resolutions that Benefit Others:

- Become a volunteer for a needy organization.
- Do something FOR someone every day (it can be something small)— without expecting anything in return.
- Listen to a friend about an issue that you have heard about many, many times before.
- Call someone (re-connect) that you have not talked with for a long time and just say hello.
- Perform random acts of kindness anonymously.
- Meet new people. If you're staying at home most of the time, you're missing out on a lot of interesting opportunities to enjoy life and share your spirit with others.
- Become more polite. Good manners have always been an important part of a civilized society and you never know what kind of day that other person has had.
- Compliment someone every day: don't forget your spouse and family members.

Think of others when preparing your list of resolutions and resolve to try one of these positive changes. You will soon notice that doing for others makes you feel better and gives you a "purpose of life" that will keep improving you all year long.

Whatever your resolution may be, take that extra step and explore who else can benefit from the improvements you are making on yourself. You never know when a little action can end up making a big difference.

I did it!


I can't believe I started a resolution on January 1, 2023, and I completed it on December 31, 2023. Typical for me is that no resolution lasts an entire year--until this one. What was the resolution? I completed reading and learning

about the Catechism of the Catholic Church with Fr. Mike Schmitz from Ascension. Each day-365 days-he read and went through sections of the Catechism and gave insightful explanations. It was such a learning and discerning experience for me. If I am perfectly honest, some days I was not listening and reading with 100% focus. This usually happened when I had to catch up a few days. I was away for a week with no internet access so when I came back that required some discipline to not give up or just skip to the present day. Other days dealt with very tough subjects and I would have to read the paragraphs over a second time, but I can say there were many more days with ah-ha moments. Fr. Mike didn't use a lot of theological language in his explanations and if he did he explained them at a level I could understand. I don't feel like an expert on the Catechism but I have a better grounding on my faith. When we were in Part Four on Christian Prayer, Fr. Mike suggested that every Catholic should read the Psalms. So starting now I plan to read a Psalm a day. There are 150 psalms in the bible. The Catechism of the Catholic Church calls prayer "a reciprocal call between God and the human family," (2591) and mentions the psalms as prayers that best illustrate how God calls each person into a mysterious encounter with him. The Book of Psalms is a book of prayers and also a book that shows us how to pray. Fr. Mike also did the Bible in a Year and it is available through Ascension media platforms. There are many more social media platforms to choose from and find the right one for you. I hope this will encourage you to start a resolution that will help you with your knowledge of our faith and deepen your relationship with our Lord.



The questions are direct and honest, even at times tough; the answers straightforward, relevant, and compelling. After the Bible, *YOUCAT* will likely become the go-to place for young people to

Finding God Every Day



A Catholic Woman's Book of Days offers daily meditations that clear a spiritual place--a time in our day when we can set our hearts on God. The meditations are brief, pointed, direct, and personal--and will connect you to God's word and the Catholic faith.
