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Sharing the Joy!

Peace be with you! The Ontario Provincial Council is reading The Joy of the Gospel together. The first line of this encyclical states, **"THE JOY OF THE GOSPEL** fills the hearts and

lives of all who encounter Jesus." Then, the first section is titled, "A JOY EVER NEW, A JOY WHICH IS SHARED."

I got so excited as I started to read, and each line spoke to my discernment of my theme. If each member of the League encounters Jesus in the other, how powerful it is!! Someone shared this graphic with me which shows the



sunflower and bee themes together. I am suggesting we BEE the difference in drawing others closer to our light, the Son; like the sunflower turns toward its light, the sun.

I remember hearing of encounters between past-national president, Agnes Bedard, and the homeless on the streets of Toronto and I was moved to tears picturing the human connections. I have participated in service projects personally where time was taken to encounter those receiving. To not just push them through a line or drop something and run but to sit, to be still and be present. The encounter is what connects us at the heart.

The Gospels show us time and time again Jesus taking these opportunities and calling us by His example to do the same, to share His joy.

Holy Father Pope Francis shares examples inviting us to rejoice in his introduction to The Joy of the Gospel.

"Rejoice!" is the angel's greeting to Mary (Lk 1:28). Mary's visit to Elizabeth makes John leap for joy in his mother's womb (cf. Lk 1:41). In her song of praise, Mary proclaims: "My spirit rejoices in God my saviour" (Lk 1:47). When Jesus begins his ministry, John cries out: "For this reason, my joy has been fulfilled" (Jn 3:29). Jesus himself "rejoiced in the Holy Spirit" (Lk 10:21).

His message brings us joy: "I have said these things to you, so that my joy may be in you, and that your joy may be complete" (Jn 15:11). In the Acts of the Apostles, we read wherever the disciples went, "there was great joy" (8:8); even amid persecution they continued to be "filled with joy" (13:52).

If we see the League as a safe space for women's ministry, we will develop deep relationships. The kind of relationship where we share "the inner workings of our heart-prayers, aspirations, insecurities, and places where God is challenging me or allowing me to struggle." [from joyful momentum, Elizabeth A. Tomlin].

I thank the Lord every day for sisters in the League who lifted me when I struggled, called me when I was drifting, and reached out to invite me to learn more about the gospels. And I thank you, for taking time to read this message, to care for others, to engage in faith, service, and social justice. God bless you and inspire you to BEE renewed sharing THE JOY OF THE GOSPEL!!





Social Justice Chairperson



Social justice is one of the three Core Values of the League along with Faith and Service; together they are the new standing committees. Social justice is the part of Catholic teaching that addresses matters of social, economic, and ecological justice in the world. The fundamentals of social justice in the League includes the *Objects of the League*, the Catholic social teaching, active involvement in society through awareness of government legislation and advocate for change through the League resolutions process. Examples of social justice issues are abortion laws, MAiD, housing, poverty, racism, human trafficking, the environment, etc.

At the provincial level, committees for social justice, resolutions reading team, resolutions review team, resolutions government visitation team and social justice award review team were formed.

During the 77th Ontario Provincial Convention in July 2024 in Sudbury, the following resolutions gifted by Sault Ste Marie and Toronto dioceses were adopted.

- ON.24.01 Elimination of the Mature Minor Doctrine in Mental Health
- ON.24.02 National School Food Program for All

The first will be posted to the Ontario website and actioned by the provincial council. The second included a bridging clause to national council. It was not accepted due to the announcement by the federal government in its spring budget to fund a national school food program. The national social justice chair encouraged the Ontario president to ask members to monitor the implementation to see if it is realized and sustainable; and, if it is not, to consider another resolution at that time.

She was gifted with her Life Membership in 2018.



Lynn exemplifies the principles of our Catholic Social Teaching which teaches us that

resources, opportunities and services should be accessible and shared fairly by everyone. Lynn makes a difference though her many Social Justice involvement such as:

- Organized mission trips to the Dominican Republic, Peru and more recently in Honduras where she assists the School Sisters of Notre Dame. She brings various school/ craft supplies and spends time in classrooms with Lenca women and children.
- Provide financial aid to Sister Mary Kennedy in Honduras through her Bucket of Hope fundraising projects.

2024 Ontario Provincial Council Presented Resolutions Outcome

League resolutions process help advocate for change by putting our faith into action. Resolutions cannot be acted on until they have been adopted at the level to which they are destined. Hence, resolutions directed to the national level for consideration that are not accepted or adopted, do not become publishable or pursuable at any level. Adopted resolutions, not directed to National are posted on the Ontario Provincial Council website.

Five resolutions were received from Hamilton, Toronto and Sault Ste. Marie dioceses for consideration by the OPC Resolutions Review Committee. Three of the resolutions were presented at the 77th Annual Ontario Provincial Council Convention on July 10, 2024, in Sudbury.

ON.24.01 Elimination of the Mature Minor Doctrine in Mental Health

The resolution gifted by the Sault Ste. Marie Diocesan Council was adopted. It urged the Ontario provincial government to enact legislation to include parents/legal guardians in the assessment, development, modification, and ongoing implementation of mental health treatment plans for children under the age of 16, thereby eliminating the practice of mature minor doctrine.



The resolution is posted on the website located at <u>Resolutions</u>

Councils and members are to review and work on the associated action

plan. The Resolutions Government Visitation Team which includes Colleen Martin, President and myself, Hilarion Mitchell, Social Justice Chairperson, will address the resolution at the next government meeting. The resolution will also be presented to the Meeting of the Assembly of Catholic of Ontario Bishops (ACBO) in September.

The resolution on *National School Food Program for All* gifted by the Toronto Diocesan Council was adopted and forwarded to the national Resolutions Review Committee. However, it was not accepted as the federal government had taken the required action in early April 2024. The resolution on *Enhancing Canadian Institute for Health Information (CIHI) Data Collection* gifted by Hamilton Diocesan Council was <u>not</u> adopted at the convention.

Our gratitude to members from the submitting councils for bringing these timely social justice topics to members' attention. We also thank the resolution committees and members for their input during the subsequent stages at the diocesan and provincial levels.

The nominee must be a member in good standing for the past five years. They demonstrate social justice in contribution to community and must include.

- a) social justice engagement at parish, community, regional, national, or international level
- b) demonstration of leadership in social justice engagement
- c) demonstration of generosity of spirit in social justice engagement
- d) extraordinary service in social justice engagement
- e) living a reflection of the mission of the League

National Spiritual Advisor Bishop Lobsinger provided greetings and shared the meaning behind his coat of arms, "He must increase, but I must decrease" (John 3:30). Another message that he wanted members to keep in mind for the next few days was, "mercy within mercy, within mercy". He encouraged members to "show mercy so that He may increase". Following his greetings, Bishop Lobsinger and Honorary Life Member Barb Dowding delivered a presentation called "Walking Together in Synodality". Bishop Lobsinger explained that synodality means to "journey together", to find ways to hear the voices of all the people of God, as all who are baptized are guided by the Holy Spirit. He said that it is not about changing the truths of our faith, but to think about how to bring the truths of our faith into our world today.

Barb Dowding asked members to discern together how the Holy Spirit is calling the Church in Canada. A synodal church is a church that listens, as quoted from Pope Francis. Barbara said to not only listen to what a person says, but by what she means and what she has experienced. She then asked members to discuss with others at their table what characteristics of female leadership is God calling forth for women in today's Church? This and other thoughtful questions were deliberated to decide what actions should be done moving forward. (Read more at: Walking Together in Synodality

Two other captivating guest presentations were:

1) "Here I Am Lord, Send Me" by author and faith speaker Leah McDonald Perrault. Leah conveyed the need to learn to love in the midst of brokenness. She shared miracles she witnessed in her own life through personal stories, and said God is acting in our lives just as powerfully. She encouraged others to have a moment with someone at their table and answer the question: "Where have I encountered Jesus?" Members were gladly reaching out their hands to each other as they spoke, some with tears in their eyes.


Leah expressed that worthiness is rooted in God's invitation: "Whom shall I send?" It is not a pretty nor easy journey, but it is the beauty and boldness of our belief that allows us to say "yes" to Jesus. She ended her presentation with an acoustic performance of the song "New Wine" by Brooke Fraser. (Leah McDonald Perrault - Here I Am Lord, Send Me)

2) An important session discussing the historical legacy of the Papal Doctrine of Discovery was presented by Archbishop Donald J. Bolen and Deacon Harry Lafond, Chief of Muskeg Cree First Nations.


Deacon Lafond expressed that we usually think of the word "discovered" as a positive term. But for Indigenous communities and the history they experienced from colonization, it is not a positive term. The Cree community sees all things designed to be interconnected and not as a

commodity to be parcelled out into pieces, and we need to learn to talk and listen to each other. A standing ovation was given for their presentation as members were encouraged to make this topic a longstanding focus in their work. (<u>Papal Doctrine of Discovery Discussion</u>)

Woven into the convention schedule were workshops presented by National Officers which, members could sign up to attend in advance. This was very well received by members as it assisted to support and further their learning of available resources offered through the CWL.



Delicious Ukrainian food was served and a live band, Brad Johner and the Johner Boys, were rocking the stage with grooving original music and a medley of classics like "Peggy Sue", "Honky Tonk Women", and "I Love A Rainy Night" and everyone was on their feet. There was a photo shoot opportunity with a giant pirate ship and even an incredible conga line was formed later in the evening from all the fun dancing!





Overall, delegates found the new convention format to be spiritually uplifting, filled with relevant information for members and provided time for sisterhood and fun. Our congratulations to the convention committee and the National Board for the opportunity to experience an outstanding convention.
