encounter various trials, for you know that the testing of your faith produces perseverance. And let perseverance be perfect, so that you may be perfect and complete, lacking in nothing."



Be humble, pray for forgiveness from God, and then meet the person you have hurt face to face with a sincere apology and no excuses. I know there is a need for me to listen and act upon these words I write ... 😔

I will leave you with a last quote as I pray you will go and read the entire letter to discern its message for you personally. Together, let us pray the Spirit's gift of courage and fortitude will move us all to withstand the temptations of the devil so that from our mouths come only blessings. May the peace that only comes from living The Joy of the Gospel flood your hearts. Amen.

The Joy of Thanksgiving for Families

Every three years, the universal Church hosts an important international event that focuses on the issues and challenges facing the family. The first World Meeting of Families was called by Saint Pope John Paul II and held in 1994 (30 years ago!) in Rome. In 2016, Pope Francis published the encyclical *Amoris Laetitia*, on the pastoral care of families. Next year's Jubilee Year will also include a Jubilee of Families.

While the secular understanding and configuration of the family has certainly changed with time, according to the Catechism of the Catholic Church (2205), "The Christian family is a communion of persons, a sign and image of the communion of the Father and the Son in the Holy Spirit...The Christian family has an evangelizing and missionary task."

How can we, as councils, offer hope to families in our midst? Over the next few months, I hope to focus on some aspects of life in our province that need attention so families can live with dignity.

Emergency Housing for Families

"We can find no social or moral justification, no justification whatsoever, for lack of housing. The Son of God came into this world as a homeless person. The Son of God knew that what it was to start life without a roof over his head." (Pope Francis 2015 World Meeting of Families in Philadelphia).



Catholic Social Teaching proclaims that we are our brothers' and sisters' keepers. God is the father of us all, and as such we are one human family and have a responsibility to care for one another. **Solidarity** is the principle that we are connected with our neighbours on our street, throughout the country and around the world.

A home provides the stability families and individuals need to build meaningful lives. For children, it means a place to call their own. Where there are homes, we have communities that work. Where people are simply housed, we have communities that are fractured and often crime ridden.

In 2022, there were 18,467 beds across 518 permanent emergency shelters in Canada. This represents an 18.5% increase in the number of emergency shelters and a 21.6% increase in

the number of beds from 2021. In 2022, the majority of shelter beds (89%) were located in the provinces of Ontario (42%), British Columbia (18%), Alberta (15%), and Quebec (14%). Among these, Ontario showed the smallest bed increase (14%).





My name is Fr. Richard Kowalchuk.

I am a priest of the Diocese of St. Catharines, ordained May, 1995. In the 29 years since my ordination, I have served in six parishes, three of these in the Diocese of Thunder Bay (I was on loan to them for 13 years) and three here. My current assignment is at a beautiful, historic church dedicated to Our Lady, named Star of the Sea. I have just completed nine years of service and somewhere near the top of the notable features of this parish is that it boasts an extremely active and visible parish council of the Catholic Women's League.

I have served the League in the capacity of

Diocesan Spiritual Advisor for the past eight years or so, a role which normally carries a fiveyear term in this diocese, but which was informally extended due to the period of relative inactivity during COVID 19. While working up in Thunder Bay from 2000-2013, I was privileged to serve as Diocesan Spiritual Advisor for the three-year term which is the norm there.

As Diocesan Spiritual Advisor for the St. Catharines Diocesan Council, I was invited to attend the annual Provincial Convention, held this year in Sudbury. As always, this gathering of about 250 women and several other Ontario diocesan spiritual advisors did not disappoint. The spiritual component was nourishing, and the business session devoted to vetting resolutions headed to the provincial and federal governments to influence future legislation, served as a reminder of the CWL's continued relevance as a formidable force for good. Many are not aware that the CWL has a voice in government (the only religious organization with this status), and, believing that the League is devoted to parish activities only, do not consider the importance of maintaining their membership year after year.



No one should think that this invitation is not meant for him or her, since `no one is excluded from the joy brought by the Lord'."
- Goodness always tends to spread. Every authentic experience of truth and goodness seeks by its very nature to grow within us, and any person who has experienced a profound liberation becomes more sensitive to the needs of others."

Gratitude

Here is a story of inspiration - A poor Scottish farmer was out walking one day when he heard a plaintive cry for help coming from a nearby bog. He ran to assist and found a boy mired almost to the waist in the black muck. Extending his walking stick, the farmer pulled the boy out. The next day, an elegantly dressed man came to the farmer's small hut, offering a reward that the Scotsman refused. Just then the farmer's young son came to the door. Seeing him, the nobleman made the Scotsman an offer: "Let me take your son and give him a good education. If the lad is anything like his father, he'll grow into a man you can be proud of." The Scotsman liked this and shook hands on the bargain.

In time, the boy graduated from St. Mary's Hospital Medical School, London. He later became Sir Alexander Fleming, the discoverer of penicillin. Years later the nobleman's son was stricken with pneumonia but was saved through the use of penicillin. The nobleman was Lord Randolph Churchill, and the son was Winston Churchill.


