- Joy and Peace: The Christmas story brings joy and peace to the world. The
 angels' proclamation of "peace on earth" reflects the message of harmony and
 goodwill that Jesus brings.

This is good news worth celebrating!

While the holiday season is often associated with gift-giving, festive gatherings, and holiday cheer, the true meaning of Christmas lies in the Incarnation—the belief that God became a human being.

John 1:14: "The Word became flesh and lived among us."



We are fortunate to have traditions and practices to guide our celebrations:

- Advent: The four weeks leading up to Christmas are a time of reflection, prayer, and preparation for the coming of Christ.
- Midnight Mass: This special Mass celebrates the birth of Jesus and often includes a reenactment of the Nativity scene.
- Christmas Day Mass: Families gather to attend Mass and give thanks for the gift of God's Son among us, incarnate. Emmanuel.
- Carols and Hymns: Traditional Christmas carols and hymns express the joy and wonder of the season.
- Charity and Giving: Catholics are encouraged to practice charity and give to those in need, embodying the spirit of giving that is central to Christmas.

By focusing on the true meaning of Christmas our faith is deepened, we connect with others and live out the teachings of Jesus Christ throughout the year.

As women of faith, we can be very 'busy' at this religious holy time. Of course, rejoice, enjoy spending time with family and friends, share gifts, help those in need and decorate BUT let us not miss the gift of Christ. Take time to be in the moment and reflect on real gift of Christmas: **Jesus!**
