PEARLS OF WISDOM

When you see geese heading south for the winter... flying along in a "V" formation ... you may wonder why they fly that way.

As each bird flaps its wings, it creates an uplift for the bird immediately following.

By flying in "V" formation, the whole flock adds at least 71% greater flying range than if each bird flew on its own.

When a goose falls out of formation, it suddenly feels the drag and resistance of trying to go it alone ... and quickly gets back into formation to take advantage of the lifting power of the bird in front.

When the head goose gets tired, it rotates back in the wing ... and another goose flies point.

Geese honk from behind to encourage those up front to keep up their speed.

When a goose gets sick or is wounded and falls out of formation, two other geese fall out with that goose and follow it down to lend help and protection. They stay with the fallen goose until it is able to fly, and only then do they launch out on their own, or with another formation, to catch up with their group. (Source Unknown)

- Use colour coded pocket folders for the officers and full executive meetings.
- File labeled file folders to keep notes in for the different meetings you attend.

From Hazel Barbour - Diocesan Secretary, Hearst-Moosonee Diocesan Counci:

Once your meeting agenda has been finalized and saved, save the file under the title: "Working Copy Agenda for Meeting...."

Then, go back into the file, and grab all the inputted material and make the entire text font in a colour of your choice (I usually use a nice blue).

Then after each item, insert as many spaces as you think you will need to be able to input the information you will record at your meeting.

Print this file and it is ready for you to handwrite your notes at the meeting.

After the meeting and time to "do the minutes", just type in your notes into your file and finalize it with a new title to indicate it is the final version.
