Policy states that monthly Mass Intentions should be offered. Colleen Martin, our Ontario Provincial President had an idea and working together it was decided to have monthly Mass intentions for all members and the Ontario Provincial Council (OPC) executive across the province.

We were so excited about the possibility of Masses being heard all across Ontario, but we could not implement this alone. Support was needed of our sisters in the League and our Spiritual Advisors.

Diocesan Faith Chairs all over Ontario worked diligently with their Spiritual Advisors on the proposed initiative.

We requested:

- A monthly Mass by each diocesan Spiritual Advisor by the OPC for the intention of all CWL members in his diocese. A total of 12 Masses per year, per diocese.
- A monthly Mass for the intention of the OPC Executive BUT each diocese would only have ONE monthly Mass per year. Each diocese was designated a month for the Mass. Twelve months, twelve dioceses.

You can imagine the logistics of organizing 156 Masses, but our goal of prayers across Ontario was spiritually uplifting!


There was some creativity along the way. Faith Chairs wanted Masses to be shared across their dioceses, so members from different areas had the opportunity to attend these special Masses.
