When the National Manual of Policy and Procedure was recently updated, the information in Append 5: Archives Guidelines for League History Provincial, Diocesan and Parish Councils was also amended. Past presidents are encouraged to become familiar with the policy to learn where archives must be located, updating and indexing archives, how information should be filed and what information should be archived. A summary of this information is available in the updated "Archives Pamphlet", as well.



Prayer to St. Philip of Neri




